**Stockholders' Meeting.**  
The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Carolina Central R. R. was held on the 10th inst in the city of New York. The old directory, consisting of Messrs. Jno. M. Robinson, R. C. Hoffman, J. S. Whedbee and J. L. Minis, of Baltimore; R. S. Tucker and Jno. C. Winder, of Raleigh; Isaac Bates, of Wilmington; D. W. Oates, of Charlotte; W. W. Chaubertlain, of Portsmouth, and C. Goddard and Dr. C. H. Roberts, of New York, were reelected.

At a meeting of the Board, held subsequently, Col. John M. Robinson was reelected President, Mr. R. C. Hoffman, Vice President and Capt. John H. Sharp, Secretary and Treasurer.

Of the 11,800 shares of stock issued 11,790 shares were represented in person and by proxy.

The total earnings of the road, from all sources, for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1889, were \$568,599.17; the operating expenses for the same period were \$394,483.94; fixed charges, which includes taxes, \$161,893.22. The net earnings therefore for the year were \$13,322.01.

Improvements have been made to the road and equipments at an expense of \$51,901.11. The roadbed and property steadily improve in condition.

The next annual meeting will be held in New York on the first Thursday after the first Tuesday in October, 1890.

Col. W. L. DeRosset, Consul for Portugal at this port, received a telegram to-day from the Consul-General at New York, stating that the King of Portugal died to-day. The Consul-General at the same time orders all Portuguese flags at half-mast for eight days.

Mr. Aug. Roder, proprietor of the new Purcell House, and Mr. W. E. Springer visited Goldsboro yesterday and purchased a large amount of furniture from the factory in that place. Had there been a furniture factory here the goods would have been bought in Wilmington. The gentlemen showed their patriotism and good sense by not going North for the goods when they could be bought at home.

**American Safes in Paris.**  
The Farrel & Herring Patent Safes have been awarded the grand Gold Medal at the present Exposition in Paris.

**The Pioneer and Her Cargo.**  
The steamship Pioneer is a total wreck. Information to this effect was received here last night by Mr. H. G. Smallbones, Superintendent of the New York & Wilmington Steamship Co. at this port. The cargo is also a total loss. The vessel was insured for \$50,000. The value of the cargo, which was owned principally by parties in this city, is unknown, as also the amount of insurance on it.

**Daily Through Freight on C. C. R. R.**  
We learn that it is in contemplation by the Carolina Central Railroad authorities to put on an early day a daily local freight train leaving Wilmington and Charlotte each morning and reaching their respective destinations, Charlotte and Wilmington, the same day. This will be a great convenience to the merchants here and patrons all along the line between the two cities.

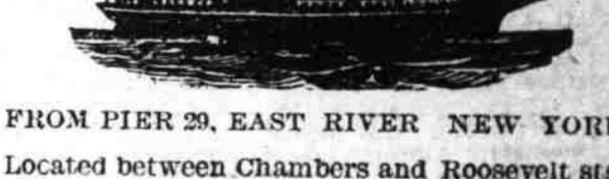
