The leader of the band of Christian Scientists in Memphis, a member of the First Baptist Church, has been expelled.

Duncan T. Parker, of Anniston, Ala., has recently given the magnificent sum of \$100,000 to the Twelfth Street Baptist Church of that city.

It is proposed to bring in a bill at the next session of the British Parliament to put a restraint on im-provident marriages, the great proportion of such marriages being made by those under 25 years of age.

When the Pope recently received a letter from Harvard University in acknowledgment of some presents which he had sent it, he read the communication out aloud slowly, and expressed his admiration of the classical Latin in which it was written.

President Harrison is not a Mason. Two members of his Cabinet are Masons, but neither of them is a Knight Templar. The only secret organization of which the President is a member is a college fraternity of the "Greek letter order," the Phi Delta Theta, which he joined in 1852, while a student at the Miami University, Ohio.

During the eight months ended August 31st, 1889, the immigration of Europeans to the United States was nearly 100,000 less than during the same period of 1888. The question of foreign immigration to this country is rapidly working out its own solution without the intervention of Congress. While the European movement to this country is rapidly declining, there is a strong increase in the emigration from Spain and Italy to South America.

Experts in California predict a sharp advance soon in the wine product of the State, as the crop is short this season, and many vineyards have fed grapes to the hogs rather than sell the fruit at the low prices offered by the wine-makers. Wine has sold as low this summer as 35 cents per gallon, and grapes have brought only \$6 per ton. The reaction has already set in, and dealers predict good prices this winter.

Mary Anderson has won a high position as a maker of bread. She writes to the London Times giving her recipe for the staff of life. She is cosmopolitan in her tastes, being an American who makes English bread out of Hungarian flour and French yeast. She says: "Bread, if made as I have described, will not turn sour, and will be sweet and moist for at least eight or ten days if kept in a pan." It is said that William Winter, the critic, considers Mary a great genius as a bread maker.

King Dinah, the Senegambian who made a sensation in Paris, has started for his native land in a precarious condition. His constitution has been wrecked by his life in the French capital. He did very well until the Shah of Persia reached Paris, but after he had hob-nobbed with the King of Kings Dinah seemed to lose his head. He dissipated in a hundred different ways and his stalwart frame seemed to defy fatigue. Suddenly he collapsed—nobody knows just why. His Persian friends never expect to see him again.

We Are Endorsed.
