It is reported that Ex-Pension Commissioner Tanner is to become a member of a firm of pension attorneys in Washington.

It was noticeable in Paris this summer that many more Americans and Englishmen spoke French than in any other previous year.

Mrs. Emma Beckwith, who is running for mayor of Brooklyn, has been greatly annoyed by street urchins, who gather in front of her house and sing: "Whoa, Emma!"

Cremation is coming more and more into vogue in Germany, in spite of the expense and certain legal difficulties which render its performance in some parts almost an impossibility. At Gotha no fewer than one hundred bodies have been cremated during the present year.

The tax aggregate for the State of Tennessee for 1889 shows a gratifying increase, especially in personal property, over last year—an increase of about \$30,000,000. Of this increase \$18,000,000 must be credited to Middle and Western Tennessee, the former having gained in exact figures for the year \$12,635,000.

The execution of the great railway project for connecting Pekin with some of the chief provincial cities has had to be postponed owing to financial difficulties. While the native Chinese capitalists are unwilling to give better security than they have hitherto offered, the high officials at Pekin are opposed to the acceptance of foreign assistance.

Since the Tories came into power in 1886 there have been eighty-four bye-elections of members of the British House of Commons, representing an eighth part of that body. Of these seats twelve have been won by the Liberals and one by the Tories. If the whole House were at the next election to be renewed in the same fashion a large Liberal majority would be secured.

On the 9th of next January Louis Kossuth will complete the period of absence from his native country, after which, unless he applies for a renewal of his rights, he will lose his Hungarian citizenship. In Turin, where Kossuth lives, and where his two sons have become Italian citizens, there is a strong desire that he should permit himself to become an Italian. But it is said that the Magyar exile will not consent to this.

A. C. Carr, the "apple king" of Kennebec county, Me., has raised a queen apple this year. The sweet and sour portions are distributed in alternate layers extending from stem to blow, and from one-half to one inch wide, and can be distinguished by the color and texture of the outside skin. The apple grew in the famous Pullen, or Benson, orchard in East Monmouth, and there said to be several trees which bear this peculiar variety of fruit.

During the recent visit of the Czar to Berlin Prince Bismarck went to a performance at the opera for the second time in twenty-four years. Both visits were of a purely formal character. The Chancellor makes no secret of his distaste for operatic music, and once told his late private secretary, Von Busch, that he would rather any day listen to a good hurdy gurdy than the finest tenors and sopranos in the world.

The oldest commodore in the United States navy is Joseph B. Hull. He was born in 1799, and was appointed a midshipman in 1813. He is a nephew of the Capt. Hull who commanded the frigate Constitution when she captured the Guerriere. Commodore Hull performed gallant service during the Mexican war and the war between the States. He was in command of the Philadelphia navy yard from 1864 to 1866. Although 90 years of age he is hale and vigorous and enjoys meeting old friends.

There are lots of improvements being made at the Wilmington Cotton Factory. We are informed that the new part which is being added to it will have a glass top to it, thus affording the employees a sufficiency of light to do their work without the expense of gas.

Receipts of Cotton.

The receipts of cotton at this port for the month of October foot up 37,697 bales, as against 47,952 bales for the same month last year, a decrease of 10,255 bales. The receipts of the crop year to date foot up 53,414 bales, as against 56,768 bales to same date last year, a decrease of 3,354 bales.

Should be Fixed.

There is a very bad place for the street car horses to travel over at the intersection of Fifth and Castle streets. The constant travel of the horses over that place has apparently made a trench between the rails, which is full of water, which runs from a water works fountain near by. It should be fixed. We hope the city authorities will take it in hand.

Postponed.

On account of the illness of the pastor, Rev. W. E. Peschau, the joint celebration of the Christian Association and the Sunday School of St. Paul's Evangelical Lutheran Church has been postponed to Sunday next, November 10th. This celebration, commemorative of the Festival of the Reformation. All Saints Eve, Oct. 31st, was to have been celebrated with great eclat by addresses and fine music at 4 o'clock to-morrow afternoon, but the committee has postponed the same to the following Sunday, that being the 400th Anniversary of that grand hero, Dr. Martin Luther, the liberator of the church.
