According to the New York Star the Democratic majority in Virginia may run up to 50,000.

Leon Abbett and James F. Campbell should reach out their long flingers and shake across the intervening mountains. One has 12,000 majority and the other 12,000 plurality.

The Democrats in Ohio have not only elected their Governor, a snail thing for the outside world but for the prestige of the fact, but they have elected a Legislature which will guarantee a Democratic successor to Senator Payne.

Ex-Secretary Bayard's wedding was the occasion of a reunion of ex-President — and next-President — Grover Cleveland and the members of his cabinet. They were a set of jolly good fellows as they "smiled" significantly over the results of the recent elections.

Senator Allison, it is said, is seriously alarmed. The Iowa Legislature will elect his successor and he fears that he will have to pack his Senatorial gripsack and "git up and git." The majority for the Republicans is very close—only three, it is said—and he is not so popular as he might be in his own party.

The Democrats all but carried the New York Assembly. The districts have been so shamefully gerrymandered by the Republicans, however, that this was a difficult thing to do. The result was very close, though. The Democrats came within 125 votes, scattered over five districts, of carrying the House, which had a Republican majority of 20 last year.

The New York Herald administered yesterday to President Harrison a still more scathing rebuke than it did the day previous. It takes the view we took yesterday. It charges him with having encouraged and aided and abetted Mahone in every way possible and then with having turned his back upon him and denied his tool when the shadows of defeat fell around him. The Herald thinks, had Mahone succeeded, Harrison would have been among the first to send in a congratulatory telegram.

Col. Dan Lamont, Roger Q. Mills, Ex-Secretary Whitney and other prominent Democrats have been interviewed by the New York Star and they all agree in saying that tariff reform had much to do with the recent splendid victories of the old party. Mr. Cleveland's emphatic and decided stand on tariff reform was the best thing for the party that could have been said or done. It was not that which caused his defeat but corruption at the polls. The signs of the times are that, if God spares him, he will be floated into the Presidency in 1892 on the top of the biggest sort of a tidal wave of tariff reform.

Here is what Ex-President and Next-President Cleveland has to say of the recent elections:

"It is evident," said Mr. Cleveland, "that the leaven of tariff reform has at last leavened the whole lump. The West, which has suffered most from the unjust burden of tariff taxation, has awakened. The State platforms of both Iowa and Ohio were abreast of the St. Louis platform on the subject of tariff reform. 'The people have considered and passed judgment. It was for the people to decide. They are now deciding. It is enough for me to say that I am satisfied at the indications and results of Tuesday's elections. 'The verdict in Virginia indicates that the South is still faithful to the Democracy of Jefferson and Jackson.'"

**Market Ordinance.**  
A special meeting of the Board of Aldermen was held yesterday afternoon to consider matters in connection with the public markets. Alderman Hicks, Mayor pro tem., presided.

On motion of Alderman Morton, Chairman of the Committee on Markets, section 9 of the Market Ordinance, requiring every huckster selling at Front Street Market to procure a badge from the City Clerk and Treasurer, was repealed; and the following was adopted in lieu thereof: "That no huckster shall be allowed to vend any articles usually sold by them at any place in the city other than in the public markets of the city and that no storekeeper shall offer or expose for sale in any store other than the stores in the public markets, and oysters or garden truck other than potatoes, celery, cabbage, onions, beets, and other dried vegetables, and that any person so offending shall forfeit and pay ten dollars for each and every offence."

On motion of Alderman Morton, Section 10 of the same ordinance, with regard to storekeepers and hucksters obstructing the sidewalk on the west side of Front street, between Dock and Orange, was also repealed, and the following, as a substitute therefor, was submitted.

Section 10. That no storekeeper be allowed to obstruct the sidewalk of Front street, between Dock and Orange, in any manner, or to any extent whatever, under penalty of ten dollars for each offence.

On motion of Alderman Post, action on this section of the ordinance was postponed until the next meeting of the Board.
