Charleston's gala week, just closed, was one of unprecedented brilliancy and success.

They are still piling up the majority in Virginia. At last accounts it was 42,000 and still growing.

There never was a more dilibrate attempt to steal a State than that now being made in Montana. The courts are with the Democrats but that is of little account in Republicans' eyes. The prospect is that there will be two Legislators and four Senators knocking for admission at Washington City. The "House of Lords" will probably admit the representatives of the steal.

Samuel J. Tilden was one of the ablest lawyers in the country. He wrote out his will very carefully and was assisted therein by other legal luminaries of the first water. He bequeathed a large amount for the purpose of founding a free library and reading room in New York, and he thought it could not be broken. He was mistaken. For five years the will has been before the Courts and it is there yet. The Court of Appeals now has it, the lower courts having decided against Mr. Tilden's own wishes and desires. A great deal of the estate has been frittered away and it is needless to say that the lawyers have had many a fat slice therefrom. Several will go from this city, not on detail, as we had previously supposed, but on leave of absence, efficient substitutes taking their places here while they are away.

City Court.

The Mayor disposed of the following cases to-day:

Peter Pitlander, charged with disorderly conduct, found guilty and fined \$20 and cost.

Wm. Pinney, drunk and down, was fined \$10 and cost.

J. Simmons, disorderly conduct, guilty and fined \$30 and cost.

William Hill, for firing a gun in the city limits, was fined \$3.95.

The Fire Chief Suspended.

Some differences have arisen between the Fire Committee of the Board of Aldermen and the Chief of the Fire Department, and at the instance of the committee Mayor Fowler to-day issued an order suspending Mr. Newman from the duties of the position. The Board of Aldermen will be called together in a few days and the matter will be heard before them, until which time we forbear any comments.

Local Advisory Board.

Mr. W. H. Gibson, special agent of the National Life Maturity Insurance Company, of Washington, D. C., last week organized here a local advisory board for the investment Department of the above company, among the white residents, and the names of some of our best citizens appear thereon. On the previous week, as has been published in the REVIEW, Mr. Gibson organized a branch among the colored residents.

Mr. Gibson goes hence to Southport where he will also establish a branch of this department and organize a local advisory board.

Accident and Loss of Life on the C. C. R. R.

A collision occurred early this morning on the Carolina Central R. R., about 12 miles from this city, which resulted in considerable damage to the rolling stock and in the deplorable death of Mr. George Smith, fireman on one of the trains.

At 4 o'clock this morning the through local freight pulled out from this city and at 5 o'clock the material train followed on her regular schedule. After leaving here, and when beyond Meares' Bluff, the freight stalled and was thus thrown considerably behind her time. Arriving at a point near Northwest, and nearly 12 miles from the city, it was stopped to take on wood and knowing that the material train was not far behind him Mr. J. S. Divine, engineer of the freight, sent a man back to flag it. It was two late however. A dense fog prevailed at the time and the material train came on and the engineer, Mr. Gaston Meares, did not see the flagman until he was close upon the freight.

He jumped and escaped unhurt, but Mr. George Smith, a young man, belonging in Laurinburg, the fireman of the train, remained on the engine and was horribly crushed and mangled. No one else was hurt, except Mr. Blackwell, of Durham, who was on the passenger coach attached to the freight train and who received some slight scratches on the face.

Mr. Smith lived but a short time after the accident but before he died he remarked that he could have escaped but that he thought his duty required him to remain on the engine and so he stayed there. He was a fine young man, and held in high esteem by the officers of the road, as well as his fellow employees. His remains were brought here and confined and forwarded this afternoon to his relatives at Laurinburg.

The two trains were sent to the shops at Laurinburg, where the necessary repairs will be made.

A ROOM FOR BURGAW.

Many Improvements Going on in the Town—Prof. Milledge's School—The E. & O. R. R. a Fixed Fact—The Merry Wedding Bells, &c., &c.

(Reported for the Review.)

While we take pride in our own county paper, it is also true that the DAILY REVIEW is popular in Pender, while the old reliable WILMINGTON JOURNAL comes to almost every farmer's fireside in the county, and I know its columns are eagerly scanned by absent ones to learn the happenings in Pender.

While we are opposed to booming and boom methods we are nevertheless trying, in a quiet way, to keep pace with the procession and nestled in our humble but happy homes you will find as much contentment and solid comfort as in the homes of any people on the globe. There seems to be a better understanding and mutual regard between the two races here than elsewhere, as our colored people are erecting better homes, advancing in citizenship, and as a further evidence of progress are building a handsome and commodious Presbyterian church in the town of Burgaw. Carpenters are also at work upon a milling plant now in process of construction, and several of our citizens are enlarging and improving their residences.

For two weeks a religious revival has been conducted in the Baptist Church and many additions have been made to its roll of membership. Our town has been fortunate in securing the very efficient service of Mr. Frank A. Milledge, of New Brunswick, Canada, to take charge of the Burgaw school. His school is growing in members and usefulness. Parents in Pender need not send their children out of the county for educational advantages when the benefit of his tuition and cheap boarding facilities in Burgaw are so convenient to them.

An invoice of road wagons, buggy and road cart arrived yesterday for the use of the surveying party and tracklayers of the Burgaw and Onslow Railroad. Within eighteen months we hope to have this project completed and Swansboro will become one of the most charming Winter resorts in the South.

On Wednesday last our town was enlivened by the occurrence of two social events in which Burgaw was the loser and happiness and cheer added to two other homes. The first was the marriage, at the home of bride's father, of Mr. L. M. McKoy to Miss Annie Laura Taylor, Rev. Duncan B. Black, of the Presbyterian Church, performing the ceremony, at 8:30 o'clock in the morning, and the bridal party and many others left for a reception at the home of the groom.

On the same day, at 9 o'clock a. m., in the Presbyterian Church, which had been handsomely decorated with a mammoth horseshoe beautifully draped in evergreens, with its characteristic motto, "Good Luck," beautifully inscribed upon it in letters of white chrysanthemum suspended on an evergreen background in which was placed in bold white letters the word "happiness," with a large marriage bell of white flowers suspended beneath, the whole resting on two pedestals beautifully arranged with choice pot plants and Marechal Niel roses, here in the soft rays of the beautiful sunlight, the soft melody of the wedding march skillfully rendered by Mrs. Jno. B. Moore and under the evergreen, ivy, holly, and mistletoe bow, Mr. George H. Walker, of Asheville, N. C., and Miss Lizzie P. Buie, of Burgaw, were made man and wife. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. Charles L. Arnold, of St. Paul's Episcopal Church, of Wilmington, in a beautiful and impressive manner. The groom entered the church on the arm of his best man, D. Walter C. Murphy, and the bride, preceded by her first maid of honor, Miss Janie Buie, entered on the arm of her father, who performed the ceremony of giving the bride away. The party immediately took a carriage for the depot and left on the early morning train for a tour of the northern cities.
