A Big Day in Cotton.
Messrs. Alex. Sprunt & Son late
yesterday afternoon cleared the
British steamship *Lochmore* for Liv-
erpool with what is by far the
largest cargo of cotton ever carried
out from this port. It consists of
8,000 bales, even, and it is valued at
\$396,300.

Messrs. Williams & Murchison
also cleared the British steamship
Wivenhoe late yesterday afternoon,
for Liverpool, with 5,176 bales cot-
ton, valued at \$252,747.

The two cargoes aggregate 13,176
bales and the total value is \$649,047.

Resigned.
Capt. John M. Walker, of this
city, for so long in the employ of
the Atlantic Coast Line, has resign-
ed the position of conductor on the
line between Wilson and Fayette-
ville, the resignation to take effect
on the 30th inst. The Wilson *Mir-
ror* says: "Capt. Walker has been
in the service of the Atlantic Coast
Line for fifteen years, and during
that whole time he has not had a
single reprimand, or been "docted,"
a single cent. A fine, admirable re-
cord for a fine, admirable official.
An honest, faithful and conscien-
tious official he is indeed; a splendid
type of a splendid gentleman.

C. F. & Y. V. Sheds.
About 40 men, nearly all car-
penters, are at work now getting
out the frame of the monster ware-
house to be erected on the C. F. &
Y. V. property, foot of Mulberry
street. As outlined, the shed will
occupy a large part of the yard and
wharf. This latter has been over-
hauled and new shingles put in and
new planking is to be laid. The ac-
cumulation of "tar, pitch and tur-
pentine" which has been taken up
from the yard is being hauled off in
city carts and laid on streets where
it is most needed. It will last a
long time.

Will Close for Two Days.
At a meeting of the Produce Ex-
change, held this day at noon, a
communication from Mr. W. A.
Willson, Secretary and Treasurer of
the city, was read, conveying reso-
lutions of the Board of Aldermen
looking to a general suspension of
business here on the 21st and 22d
inst., the days of the Fayetteville
Centennial celebration. The recom-
mendations of the Board of Alder-
men was fully approved and concurred
in and Col. Cantwell, Secretary of
the Exchange, was requested to
notify Mr. Willson of the same. The
Exchange will therefore be closed
on those days and it is now in order
for the up-town merchants to act.

Looks Like Business.
The Cnslow R. R. people are push-
ing ahead. About one-half mile of
track is laid in the lower part of the
city. The track laying was not be-
gun at the river but a quarter of a
mile or so from it, and the rails
were hauled up through the heavy
sand by mule power. The trestle
leading from the sand-hill to the
water-front is, however, about com-
pleted, and connection will soon be
made there, when the work can be
rapidly pushed forward. Cross-ties
for this road are being got out in
abundance near the city and are
being hauled and laid by the grade,
ready for use. It looks as though
the work of construction is to be
pushed forward rapidly at an early
date.

The Lutheran Synod.
This body, composed of delegates
from the several State District
Synods of the South, is called "The
United Synod of the Evangelical
Lutheran Church South." A toler-
ably full delegation is in attend-
ance, and there are a number of
visiting ministers attracted by the
interesting questions which are to
come before this body.

The church, St. Paul's Lutheran,
beautiful in its unadorned unique-
ness, was made especially attrac-
tive by some mottoes and emblems
on evergreen suggestive of the great
occasion, viz: the meeting of the
third convention of the United Syn-
od. "Welcome", wrought in lily
green, and overarching the altar,
spoke to the heart as well as to the
eye. Suspended between the dates
1517 and 1889, and taken in connec-
tion with the speaking picture of
Martin Luther nailing up the 95
theses, the loyal son of the church
would easily imagine that "wel-
come" was the musical intoning of
Luther's hammer sounding down
through the intervening 373 years.
History, poetry and devotion coun-
ting in the elaboration of gar-
landed flowers and evergreens, and
if the Synod shall not be a pleasant
and profitable one it will not be on
account of any lack in the welcome
and comfort extended by St. Paul's.
