The three banks in this city, First National Bank, Bank of New Hanover and Wilmington Savings and Trust Co., will all be closed on Thursday and those who have business with them will govern themselves accordingly.
The Wilmington Light Infantry were inspected last night, and they made a handsome turnout. There were about 45 men in full uniform and the inspection took place under the electric light at the corner of Market and Third streets. They will leave here to-morrow for Fayetteville on the steamer *A. P. Hurt*.

The first contingent from this city to the Fayetteville Centennial left here to-day. A party of ladies and gentlemen went up this morning on the 9 o'clock train via Wilson, others left on the *Murchison* at 2 o'clock, and still others went off on the Carolina Central at 3 o'clock. Wilmington will be well represented at Fayetteville.
