**Death of Mr. Joshua James.**  
Mr. Joshua James, brother of Mr. John S. James, of this city, and uncle of the editor of this paper, died at his residence at New Carthage, Ia., last Saturday morning, at the advanced age of 82 years. The remains were interred yesterday in New Orleans.

Mr. James was a native of old New Hanover county and removed from this city to Louisiana in the year 1835. He engaged in cotton planting on the Mississippi river and at the opening of the war was one of the largest planters in the State. His place was located directly opposite to that of Ex-President Davis, who was on the Mississippi side of the river and the two gentlemen have always been warm personal friends.

Mr. James' wife died many years ago, after bequeathing him four children, all boys. One of these died in infancy and two after they had reached man's estate. But one survives his father's death.
