German papers assert that both the Ex-Empress Frederick and her sister, Princess Alice, regularly reported to their mother, Queen Victoria, the secrets of Germany's diplomatic and military operations during 1870.

Judge A. M. Kelly, the American member of the International Court at Cairo, Egypt, has just sent to Richmond a large photograph of Pompey's pillar, which is to be reproduced for the monument to be raised to the private soldiers of the Confederate army.

It will be proposed in the next Congress as part of the Republican programme of tariff revision to increase the protective duties on imported mineral waters. The free and independent springs of America, it appears, are incapable, without more tariff, of competing with the "pauper labor" of the mineral springs of effete Europe.

Following close upon the heels of the big fire in Lynn comes the news of another terrible conflagration in Boston's business centre. Two acres, covered with elegant business structures, were burned over and the loss is estimated at ten millions. It is well insured, however, and the losers can bear the disaster. But it was a big Thanksgiving bonfire.

Mr. Gladstone is a very prolific writer. During his distinguished career he has published no fewer than 300 books and pamphlets, exclusive of numberless newspaper and magazine articles. Perhaps the ex-premier's pen has scribbled on more postcards than that of any other man either living or dead. Several cases are reported to have taken place on the broad road from Bencoomah to Bodo and Kibim. Six persons were reported to have been killed and eaten.
