Mr. George W. Childs has been elected president of the Pennsylvania Horticultural Society.

Carl Schurz, who has been so seriously ill with pleurisy at his residence in New York, is improving.

The net earning of all of the railroads comprised in the Richmond and Danville system have been \$3,895,888 during the past year.

The President has nominated Judge David J. Brewer, of Kansas, a nephew of Justice Fields, to be an Associate Justice of the Supreme Court.

The Lee Monument Association have presented the equestrian statue of the great soldier, which is now nearly completed, to the State of Virginia.

A reverend English bishop has confessed that the two chief ambitions of his life have been to write a good novel and to run a hotel "on the best principles."

Queen Victoria is said to have a number of manuscripts in her possession, consisting mainly of poem and short stories, which may be published after her death.

Gov. Jackson, of Maryland, has withdrawn his proclamation as to the Hog island flats and the oyster differences between that State and Maryland will be amicably adjusted.

It is stated—not upon the best authority, however—that Mr. Stanley's new book is to be entitled "How I Relieved Emin," and that he is to receive £40,000 for the copyright.

When the doctors fall out, who shall agree? Dr. Blaine says that "trusts are largely private affairs," and Dr. Harrison pronounces them "dangerous conspiracies against the public good."

Mr. Irying M. Scott, one of the proprietors of the Union Iron Works of San Francisco, enjoyed his visit to Baltimore thoroughly. He left there a poor boy. He returned a millionaire. His company employs 1,400 men.

The proceedings in Congress are thus far very tame and of no general interest. The Senators from three of the four new States were seated yesterday. In the Senate 505 bills were introduced yesterday, against 568 on the first day of the last Congress.

And what's the matter with Hannah? We mean Montana. Oh, she's all right. The Republicans are very anxious to compromise on a basis of one Senator to each party but the Democrats can't see it by the light of that tallow dip and so they still hold the fort.

Mr. Benny Bowlegs has not set the Potomac river on fire yet. His message seems to have fallen upon Congressional ears, for the most part as something "flat, stale and unprofitable." The quotation doesn't miss the mark very far. No previous message has excited so little interest.

The lame insinuation in the opening of the President's message, that it might be stolen by hungry reporters, is decidedly out of place. The general sentiment seems to be that when Mr. Harrison's imitations and appropriations of Democratic policy are eliminated from the paper there will be nothing left to steal.

Henry George says that he will, as soon as the funds are available from the bequest of nearly \$30,000 left to him by a New Jersey farmer for the dissemination of such work as "Progress and Poverty," print as large an edition as the money will allow for distribution among farmers, and will turn over everything above the bare cost to the widow, in whose favor he had already offered to abandon his claims, if the collateral heirs would abandon theirs.
