Memorial Services at St. John's. Prayers were offered in St. John's Church yesterday for Mr. Davis. At this church, on Wednesday, at 11 o'clock, there will be Memorial Services, under the auspices of the Wilmington Light Infantry, who will attend in a body.

A Worthy Representative. Col. J. L. Cantwell has been worthily chosen to represent us at New Orleans. The following has been handed in to us at a late hour this afternoon:

HEADQUARTERS W. L. I. Dec. 9th, 1889. Special orders No. 2. Private J. L. Cantwell, who served with distinction in both the Mexican and Civil War is hereby ordered to report to New Orleans, La., to represent this command at the funeral of our late honored and distinguished honorary member, President Jefferson Davis.

By order of the Captain, W. R. KENAN, Commanding. DUVAL FRENCH, First Sergeant. Capt. W. R. Kenan was Adjutant of the 43d N. C. Infantry, and at Drewry's Bluff, May 16th, 1864, was under fire with President Jefferson Davis and his staff.

A NEW MEMORIAL DAY. Programme for Wednesday, December 11th, Adopted by the Committee.

At a meeting this morning of the committee of arrangements for the Memorial Services of Ex-President Davis to be held at the Opera House on Wednesday, 12th, the following appointments were made and programme adopted.

Mr. Chas. M. Robinson was requested to take charge of the vocal music. Col. E. D. Hall and Mr. F. W. Kerchner, on the part of the committee, were requested to take charge of all arrangements at the Opera House.

Messrs. John H. Currie and J. C. Stevenson, on the part of the committee, were requested to notify all who were invited to take an active part in the services. Hon. A. M. Waddell will present the resolutions.

An address will be made by Hon. Geo. Davis. Hon. Chas. M. Stedman, Revs. T. H. Pritchard, D. D., W. S. Creasy and P. Moore will be also requested to make addresses.

Rev. Jas. Carmichael, D. D., was appointed to make the opening prayer and Rev. P. H. Hoge to pronounce the benediction.

The programme is as follows: Dirge by the Band. Organization by the Chairman of Committee. Prayer by Rev. J. Carmichael, D. D. Music by the Choir. Report of Committee on Resolutions. Presentation of Resolutions by Hon. A. M. Waddell. Addresses. Music by the Choir. Benediction. Music by the Band at the Dispersion.

Seats will be reserved for the Ladies' Memorial Association, the Third Regiment Association and the Veteran Corps.
