Ladies' Memorial Association.
A meeting of the Ladies' Memorial Association was held yesterday afternoon at the "Atlantic" Hall. There was a large attendance of members, and much interest was evinced by all in the objects and purposes of the meeting.

In the matter of placing a medalion commemorative of Jefferson Davis on the Confederate Monument in Oakdale Cemetery, it was resolved to carry out this object, and the following named ladies were appointed a committee to confer with the President of the Association with regard to the best plan or method of raising the necessary fund: Mrs. Gen. Whiting, Mrs. T. H. McKay, Mrs. Gabriel Holmes, Mrs. Jennie DeRosset, Mrs. T. C. Craft, Miss Katie Taylor, Miss Eliza Holmes and Mrs. W. R. French. The intention of the ladies is to have the medalion made and put in place on the monument in time for the next annual Memorial observance on the 10th of May.

The erection of a bronze monument to perpetuate the memory of the late ex-President was also discussed, and it was resolved to invite the co-operation of the citizens generally in raising a fund for this purpose. The monument, or statue, to be erected at such point in the city as may hereafter be agreed upon. A committee was suggested to confer with gentlemen interested with regard to raising the funds needed for this purpose, and Mrs. Dr. Anderson, Mrs. W. R. Kenan, Mrs. Josh T. James, Mrs. A. L. DeRosset, Mrs. Charles D. Myers, Mrs. Charles M. Steadman and Mrs. J. J. Hedrick were appointed.

One of the best things in the number is the opening paper of another series, "Confessions of an Amateur Photographer." The serious side of art is given by Mrs. Moore in "Children's Portraits in the Louvre," with beautiful pictures. The illustrated poems are good. "Men and Things" is rich with anecdote.
