The Raleigh correspondent of the Petersburg Index Appeal says: The supreme court has just rendered a decision of a very important character and which caused considerable surprise. A former clerk of the superior court of Iredell county was indicted for embezzlement, in appropriating money to his own use, money received into his office for the use of the distributee of an estate. The case went up on appeal and the court holds that section 1014 of the code does not sustain the indictment, as that section does not embrace clerks of the superior courts and other similar officers. It applies to officers of corporations, not public officials. Its purpose is to protect individuals and partnerships and corporations against their officers and servants. Nor is the offense within section 1016, as the money embezzled was not in trust for the county. Nor is the indictment sustained by section 1090 as the defendant is not charged with willfully omitting to perform a duty except by inference which is not sufficient. The legislature has not made clerks and all other public officers subject to the statute defining embezzlement, relying on the sufficiency of their bonds and their liability for malfeasance in office as a check upon their dishonesty. This opinion leaves the people of the several counties helpless so far as punishment against defaulting officials is concerned. The next general assembly will no doubt remedy the evil.

New York Star: A rather stout, elderly gentleman of middle height, grizzly hair and a putty white face, who went slowly along Broadway, as if easy-walking to him were a lost art, was pointed out to me as the Hon. William Lawrence of Ohio. This once prominent and able politician is evidently "a back number" and "lags superfluous." He is remembered dimly now about Washington as a member of the House who had once been awfully sat upon by the whole House without regard to party or previous condition. There was a debate on his reference to the back pay members had voted themselves that had created great disgust over the country. Lawrence delivered a great tirade at the iniquity of such conduct. He had scarcely resumed his seat before the Hon. Ben Butler claimed the eye of the Speaker and produced the Congressional Record, in which it appeared that the Hon. William Lawrence had voted him self back pay on a previous occasion, and Benjamin, yet holding the floor, asked the honorable gentleman from Ohio if the Record reported him correctly. The honorable Ohioan admitted reluctantly that the Record was correct, but that the amount was so small that it ought not to count. When Benjamin subsided, the Hon. S. S. Cox sprang to his feet, holding aloft a report of a committee appointed to investigate the New York Custom House, of which Lawrence was Chairman, that had a likeness of said Lawrence as a frontispiece. Cox's comments on the art of making Uncle Sam pay for this illustration of Custom House frauds threw the House into roars of laughter. But when the Hon. Proctor Knott interrupted Cox with an agricultural report, in which appeared, as "Sir William," a cut of an imported ram belonging to the Congressional wool raiser of Ohio, the roars rose to shrieks. From that out Lawrence was known as Sir William until the constituents withdrew their wocly representative.
