George William Curtis says in
Harper's Weekly that Grover Cleve-
land is the foremost gentleman of
the land to-day. George William's
head is decidedly level.

'Greensboro, this State, is said to
be on a "boom" just now in view of
the prospect for the establishment
of a Bessemer iron foundry at that
place. Real estate has advanced to
what may be termed "fancy prices."

It is reported here to-day that
Henry W. Grady, the brilliant young
Georgia journalist, who recently
delivered that magnificent speech
on the South, in Boston, is dead. We
can but hope that the report is un-
true.

Joe Howard, who makes many
startling statements in the columns
of the *New York Press*, says that a
man does not approximate wealth
in these days until he has \$5,000,000,
and he believes that there are over
two hundred such men in New York.

For the first time in the history of
that institution, the quarterly
financial report of the directors of
the penitentiary shows the earnings
to be in excess of the expenses. The
expenses for September were \$16,501-
67; for October, \$20,846.63; for
November, \$20,180.95—total for the
quarter, \$57,529.25. The earnings
for September were, \$24,171.83; for
October, \$21,572.09; for November,
\$18,365.00—total for the quarter,
\$64,108.93. Excess of earnings, \$6,
571.01.

The *Raleigh News and Observer*
says: "It seems that Senator Blair
has modified his school bill so as to
remove some of the objections that
it was formerly open to. We had
formerly advocated that the Demo-
cratic House should take the bill
and eliminate all objectionable fea-
tures, and then pass it. When the
Democratic House gave place to a
Republican one, we did not expect
that such amendments as were de-
sired would be made; but if they
can be made now, we would favor
the passage of the measure."

North Carolina seems to be loom-
ing up grandly as a first class min-
eral State. Recently there have
been big gold finds in Montgomery
and only to-day we found a state item
telling about some one having pick-
ed up a genuine diamond in Moore,
and now from the Lenoir Topog we
learn that the Watauga silver mine
has been explored sufficiently to
show that it is a very valuable mine.
In Stokes county it is declared that
there is a lead of twenty miles of
magnetic iron ore embracing prob-
ably two hundred properties of vast
value. The lead is three miles wide
and a number of veins may be seen
from ten to fifteen feet thick, carry-
ing from 40 to 70 per cent. of pure
metal. The ore is said to be free
from phosphorus and sulphur. These
things are very important.
