### The Badge Presented.

At a meeting of the Howard Relief Fire Engine Co. No. 1, held last night, Mr. M. Rathjen, the President, presented Mr. Henry Gieschen with the beautiful gold badge awarded him for efficiency in the past year. Mr. Rathjen's remarks were good and to the purpose and the reception was acknowledged by Mr. Gieschen in a handsome little speech. At the same meeting applications for membership were acted upon and three new members were admitted.

### First National Bank.

The annual meeting of the stockholders of the First National Bank of Wilmington was held at their banking house in this city at 11 o'clock to-day.

Hon. Walter L. Steele, of Rockingham, was called to the chair and Mr. H. M. Bowden, Cashier of the Bank, was made secretary of the meeting.

The attendance was larger than usual and the exhibits made were very gratifying.

The following gentlemen were elected as Directors for the ensuing year, they constituting the old board, viz: Messrs. George Chadbourn, James Sprunt, G. H. Smith, B. F. Hall, H. M. Bowden.

### Not Exactly Right.

Somebody has been stuffing our neighbor of the *Star* in regard to the Wilmington of many years ago. He says that "cotton-laden schooners from Onslow and Pitt (?) counties discharged their cargoes at a wharf then situated at the Northeast corner of Market and Second streets."

"To do this they went up 'Jacob's Run,' which was at that time 'a small stream, with sufficient depth for vessels drawing two or three feet of water.'" On the contrary, Jacob's Run finds its source less than three hundred yards from the point mentioned and is fed by a few springs only. We doubt if there was ever two feet of water in it anywhere, and if there was ever three feet there was never a corn-cracker yet in Wilmington that could float in that water without a bushel of cargo or ballast in her.

Again, our neighbor tells of the cold snap in January, 1857, and says that the Cape Fear was frozen over and that there are parties now living who skated on the ice on it at that time. We remember the cold of that year perfectly well, and the fact that the river was frozen over, but it was early in the morning, the coat of ice was a very thin one and broke through as soon as the tide turned and if anybody skated on the Cape Fear then it must have been on the bottom of the river.

### Oakdale Cemetery.

The regular annual meeting of the lot owners of Oakdale Cemetery was held last night. Mr. DuB. Cutlar was called to the chair and Mr. R. J. Jones was made secretary.

Mr. Jones submitted his twenty-third annual report as secretary and treasurer. Mr. T. Donlan, superintendent, also submitted his report, which was read and placed on file. An election of a president and board of directors for the ensuing year resulted as follows:

President—Donald MacRae.  
Directors—Dr. A. J. DeRosset, Clayton Giles, James H. Chadbourn, W. H. Northrop, David G. Worth, Owen Feunell.

The superintendent, in his report, gives the total number of interments in the cemetery during the year 1889 as 83; number of removals, 23; lots sold 15; lots improved, 18; lots on perpetual list, 68; lots kept in order by the year, 353. Three hundred and fifty neglected lots have been worked over and put in good condition during the year; over 900 feet of new fencing has been built, and 600 feet of old fencing moved and repaired. This was done to enclose new ground recently purchased, and give the cemetery a straight line of fence from creek to creek. The Cemetery Company now have a water front surrounding the grounds, except on the south side, which is bounded by the fence above referred to. Sixty dry wells or catch basins have been placed at the intersection of avenues, with cast-iron grating over them, and with drains leading from the walls to the creek. This was done to carry off the surface water so as to save the roadways from washing, and has proved a success. Nearly 7,000 brick and 1,500 feet of six-inch drain pipe were used for this purpose. The new grounds recently purchased have been cleared of underbrush and a new avenue will be opened around the same as soon as practicable.
