Ice-men in New York are reported to be fearful that the ice crop will be very small this year.

Mrs. Davis is at work on the auto-biography of her husband which was unfinished at the time of his death. It will be ready for publication soon.

The Atlanta Constitution says the population of that city, according to the now complete returns in the city directory office, is over 87,000, against 77,677 last year and 37,000 in 1880. The Constitution predicts that in 1900 Atlanta will have a population of 200,000.

French journals are still insisting that the real object of Stanley's expedition into Africa was to prepare the way for the creation of a vast British-African Empire to extend from the Cape to the region of the Great Lakes, and from that region to Egypt across the equatorial provinces. Of this Empire Stanley is to be made the Governor.

The Savannah News shrewdly observes that, while some of the Northern newspapers speak slightly of President Davis' article, showing that most of the suffering of the Federal prisoners at Andersonville was due to the action of the Federal authorities with regard to them, the same papers are very careful not to print the article itself.

In a lecture on mining, metals and precious stones, given at the Peabody Institute, Baltimore, Dr. David T. Day said that the value of the metals mined in a year was about \$200,000,000. The value of the pig iron mined in 1888 was more than all the metals put together. The amount of gold mined in a year would only half fill a Saratoga trunk.

Prof. Haddon, the English naturalist, who has just spent some months on the islands south of New Guinea, says there will never again be so good a time as now to study the natives and make anthropological collections, as the Papuans there are dying out fast, and are still more rapidly discarding their native arts, preferring to buy the merchandise that the whites bring among them.
