M. Ephrussi, a rich banker of Paris, has gained the \$125,000 prize in the Panama Canal lottery.
Count Aloys Karolyi has left a fortune of \$2,500,000 and an estate in Hungary which produce upwards of \$200,000 a year.
John Fogarty, a youth of 18, of Bayshore, L. I., has become insane through the excessive use of cigarettes, of which, it is said, he usually smoked two or three boxes a day.
Senator Stanford has given \$500 to Susan B. Anthony for the benefit of the woman suffrage cause. Part of the money will be used to print and distribute 5,000 pamphlets in South Dakota.

George W. Childs has lately added 320 clocks to the number he had on hand, and he is now the possessor of over 1,100 tick-tack time pieces, which he keeps in a room set aside for the purpose.

England is probably the only great power which can point to a decrease in the total strength of its military establishment during the past twelve months. The British army is less numerous by about 1,000 men than it was a year ago.

President Harrison plays billiards oftener than did any of his predecessors. When he entered the White House he played a very poor game, but by practicing with Elijah Halford he has improved in his manipulation of the cue.

It is said that Gen. Alger, Assistant Postmaster General Clarkson, ex-Senator Platt, of New York, and George M. Pullman, of Chicago, are planning to buy the Chicago Times and make it an advocate of Gen. Alger for the Presidency.

The Swiss Federal Government has proposed to the Swiss councils to celebrate the 60th anniversary of the foundation of the Swiss confederation on August 1st next, by cantonal fetes, and on the following day by a great federal fete at Berne.

Mr. Thomas B. Womack, of Pittsboro, has been appointed by Gov. Fowle to the vacancy on the Superior Court Bench made vacant by Judge Gilmer's resignation. Mr. Womack is quite a young man yet, only 35 years of age, but he is a good lawyer and has seen much public service.

Mrs. James Brown Potter has left London for Australia, but before leaving she turned loose her wrath upon newspaper reporters, and particularly those of the feminine gender, who, she said, examined her costumes, and wrote indecent articles about them.

It is related that when Mr. Calvin S. Brice went to college he found it hard work to pay his necessary expenses. The D. K. E. Fraternity was the swell one of the college. A number of boys saw that Brice was a brainy fellow, and his name was proposed. He was blackballed by a young aristocrat, but the other members told the latter that unless he voted for Brice he would be expelled himself. Brice was admitted.

Norfolk Virginian: "Secretary Blaine has the profound sympathy of the country because of the heavy affliction that has befallen him in the sudden death of his son, Walker Blaine. He was a young man of great ability, and gave the promise of a bright and successful career. The regret at his death is universal throughout the country." The Virginian, of course, speaks for itself and its own people, but it essays too much when it tries to voice the grief of the "country." We are not unmindful of the old adage, *De mortuis nil nisi bonum*, and we do not think we violate it, either in the spirit or the letter, when we say that the people down this way are profoundly indifferent about the matter. They have never had any cause to rejoice at the fact that Mr. Walker Blaine was born into this world and have therefore no particular regret to indulge because he has departed from it.

It seemed plain and straightforward and the fact that she arranged her hair and dress carefully before leaving the room and did not rush into the street and make known at once the fact that she had been dishonored is not only what a sensible and modest girl would do but in this respect is decidedly in her favor. She probably did not know what to do, her only desire being to shield her shame until she could get home and fell of the outrage there and seek advice and counsel from those who were sure to feel for her. And this is just exactly what she did do.
