The vessel reported by us yester-
 day as ashore turns out to be the Br.

 bound from Barbadoes for this port,
 in ballast. She truck on the Middle

 channel. The crew consists of ten
 men. Capt. Troop's wife and daugh-
 ter were aboard but they were taken
 off and landed at Southport. The
 vessel was still ashore this afternoon
 and is reported as full of water, and
 lying in the same position. Capt.
 Skinner will send a steam pump
 down to be put aboard of her and
 Capt. Tom Harper's steam tugs will
 take a pull on her this afternoon, at
 high tide.

To Open February 15th.

Col. Gray and Capt. Fry, of the
 C. F. & Y. V. R. R., accompanied by
 Messrs. J. W. Brown and J. C.
 Wreshall, of Baltimore, and Dr. D.
 W. C. Benbow, of Greensboro, made
 a trip of inspection yesterday after-
 noon over the line of the road lead-
 ing out from this city. To-day these
 gentlemen went down to Southport
 on the Company's steamer, the
Compton.

It is said now that the road will
 be completed by the first of Febru-
 ary and that it will be open for traf-
 fic to Mt. Airy, 248 miles distance,
 on the 15th of that month. A daily
 service will then be inaugurated, the
 train leaving here at 9:40 and arriv-
 ing at Mt. Airy at 7:45. The down
 train will arrive here at 6:45. Dinner
 will be taken, both ways, at Fayetteville.
