 Montgomeryshire.

 to avail themselves of the advan-  
 tages the place affords

The German Socialists are flooding  
 the factory towns throughout Ger-  
 many with Socialistic leaflets ex-

 elections and claiming the rejection  
 of the Socialist bill by the Reichstag  
 as a victory, which, if followed up  
 at the polls will compel complete  
 recognition of the rights of the  
 Social Democracy.

One of the great evidences of the  
 progress and development of the  
 South which the eleventh census  
 will bring out is the remarkable in-  
 crease of banks and banking capital  
 in this section. In 1880 there were  
 220 national banks in the South,  
 with a total capital of \$45,597,000.  
 Last year the number of our national  
 banks was 472, and their capital ag-  
 gregated \$79,454,020.

*Times*, Ex-Governor Lee is very  
 much amused at Senator Ingalls'  
 discussion of the negro question, the  
 absurd illogical standpoint from  
 which he urged the question, the  
 incendiary utterances in his speech

 The Governor says Ingalls lacks in-  
 formation, that a short residence in  
 the land of oppression, as Ingalls  
 calls the South, would turn Ingalls  
 a negro hater and oppressor worse

**NORTH CAROLINA**  
**Car Service Association,**  
 RALEIGH, N. C., January 15th, 1890.  
 To all Consignors and Consignees of Freight:

A serious loss and much inconvenience  
 have been caused, both to shippers and rail-  
 road companies, by the unnecessary detention  
 of cars in loading and unloading freights.  
 Shippers are often unable to procure cars,  
 tracks are encumbered, and the speedy move-  
 ment of freight is impossible under the prac-  
 tices that have prevailed. The railroad com-  
 panies feel obliged, therefore, to endeavor to  
 correct this evil, and have issued the notice  
 printed below:

The system thus established has been in  
 force at a number of important points during  
 the past year, with advantageous results in  
 every instance. The amount charged is not  
 sufficient to recompense the companies for the  
 use of their cars, tracks, etc., for warehouse  
 purposes, and is not collected for the purpose  
 of revenue, but for the prevention of abuses  
 which affect both the public and the transpor-  
 tation lines.

The rules will be enforced without discrimi-  
 nation by the North Carolina Car Service As-  
 sociation, which will act for all interests alike.

**Notice.**

Notice is hereby given that on and after  
 March 1st, 1890, cars remaining unloaded for-  
 ty-eight (48) hours, after being placed for de-  
 livery, shall be subject to a charge of one dol-  
 lar (\$1.00) per day, or fraction thereof, for de-  
 tention of cars and use of tracks.

If cars be consigned to private sidings, and  
 such sidings be already full, or if consigned to  
 general delivery tracks, and the prompt  
 placing of cars be prevented by the presence  
 of cars belonging to the same consignee held  
 under load for more than forty-eight (48)  
 hours, it shall be considered that they have  
 been placed for delivery at the time of arrival  
 at the yard or siding where held.

Forty-eight (48) hours will be allowed for  
 loading empty cars after being placed in posi-  
 tion, after which time the Car Service rate of  
 one dollar (\$1.00) per day, or fraction thereof,  
 for detention and use of tracks will apply.  
 Sundays and legal holidays are excepted in  
 the computation of time of detention of cars  
 and use of tracks.
