**STATE NEWS.**  
**Rockingham Rocket:** Mr. James A. Wright has invented a device which automatically exhibits a card bearing the name of the station as a train approaches a station on the railroad. The machine is placed in the forward end of the car and does not stutter, talk back nor slam the door. Mr. Wright has got a good thing and will be patented.

**Fayetteville Observer:** The Methodists all over North Carolina will learn with many regrets that the Rev. Dr. Robbitt is leaving this city and that little hope is entertained for his permanent recovery. He came hither about three weeks ago, and was seized almost immediately with a hard chill, from the effects of which he has never recovered, and la grippe is supposed to have followed. His restoration is not impossible, but hardly probable.

**Greensboro Workman:** If Postmaster General Wauwacker would listen while to the well authenticated complaints against some of his route agents who do not know the capital of the State of North Carolina when they get to it, but carry the mail past, and then have to send it back next day, he would be qualified to hear other complaints that come thick and heavy from other places of less importance. We suggest to him that he postpone the medal business just long enough to inquire into the mail service in North Carolina.

**Charlotte Chronicle:** The Mecklenburg Times, the official Alliance organ, published in Charlotte, and edited by Jerome Dowd, son of ex-Congressman Dowd, is out this week in a double headed column editorial in favor of Capt. Sid B. Alexander for Congress, proposing him as a representative of the farmers. The citizens committee on the Lutheran Female Seminary held a meeting yesterday and decided to make a final effort to raise the amount requisite to secure the institution. The amount necessary is \$15,000, and the committee have asked ten days' extension. Charlotte has raised to date \$12,000 of which amount \$5,000 has been contributed by the Lutherans. If \$15,000 is not raised, Charlotte will not secure the Seminary.

**Raleigh News and Observer:** A large oil painting of Capt. Hughes was hung in the State Library on yesterday. Capt. Hughes was Adjutant General of Pettigrew's Brigade, and fell at Gettysburg, mortally wounded, while leading the brigade in the third day's engagement. His wound was serious. Being carried to Martinsburg, Va., he lingered in great pain until death came to his relief on the 15th of July, 1863. No braver man drew his sword in defence of the Southern cause than Capt. Hughes, and in his death North Carolina lost one of her best and much-loved sons. Parties who arrived here yesterday gave reports of a serious affair which occurred at Greensboro the night before. It seems that a crowd of young fellows who were occupying a room at the McAdoo House were indulging in a drinking carousal, &c., and became very boisterous. Some time during the night Mr. Will Humphrey, the clerk, went up for the purpose of interfering. Hot words ensued and some of the crowd attacked Mr. Humphrey and used him so roughly that he was soon overpowered. The crowd then left the hotel, but soon returned with reinforcements, the party this time numbering about ten or twelve. The door had been locked to keep them out, but they succeeded in gaining an entrance. They attacked two negro porters and beat them both severely. One of them, it is feared, will suffer serious results from his injuries. In the midst of the din, which took place in the office of the hotel, Mr. McAdoo appeared on the scene and advanced upon the enemy with a stick. Chairs were flourished around and sticks were used freely. Several of the number attacked Mr. McAdoo and almost rent his clothing from him. Chandeliers were smashed and furniture was demolished generally. It is stated that Mr. McAdoo has the names of all the parties and will have them prosecuted.
