 Mr. and Mrs. F. W. E. Peschau celebrated yesterday their mutual birthday. A reception was held last night at their residence, which was attended in a body by the Children's Society of St. Paul's E. L. Church. The Germania Band called and gave them an exquisite serenade and many hearty congratulations were tendered. In many instances the congratulations were accompanied with beautiful presents.

**Death of Mr. Voss.**  
 We regret to learn of the death at his residence in this city, this morning, of Mr. John G. Voss, an old and well known citizen. He had been sick for months past and the end was not unexpected. The interment will be in Bellevue to-morrow afternoon.  
 Mr. Voss was a native of Oldenburg, Germany, and came to Wilmington in 1858, he then being but 26 years of age. He was a good citizen and a Confederate veteran, having been a member of Co. A. (German Volunteers) 18th N. C. Regiment.

**Audit and Finance.**  
 The Board met yesterday afternoon in semi-monthly session. Present, Mr. R. J. Jones, chairman, and Messrs. Wm. Calder and W. R. Kennan.  
 The Board disapproved the recommendation of the Board of Aldermen for the appointment of a clerk for the Fifth Street Market house, at a salary of \$5.00 per month.  
 The action of the Board of Aldermen making an appropriation for repairs to the floor of Cape Fear Engine house was approved, and the contract was awarded to Mr. J. F. Post, at \$75.  
 In the matter of paving the east side of Third Street, from Market to Red Cross, for which the Board of Aldermen made an appropriation of \$500, this Board recommended that the work be deferred until the next fiscal year.  
 Also the appropriation of \$250, voted by the Board of Aldermen for paving the east side of Fourth Street, from Market to Mulberry, was non-concurred in, with the recommendation that the matter be deferred until the next fiscal year.  
 The Board concurred in the action of the Board of Aldermen in ordering that matured city bonds in the hands of the Commissioner of the Sinking Fund, amounting to \$4,500, be burned under the supervision of the Board of Audit and Finance.  
 Bills were audited and approved as follows: Current expenses, \$292.85; loans, \$5,000; interest on same, \$90.42; coupons, \$11,541; refunded tax, \$5.00. Seven hundred and three coupons which had been redeemed and cancelled, were burned in the presence of the Board.
