STATE NEWS.

Raleigh News and Observer: The Raleigh ice factory has commenced to make ice for the coming season. Capt. Francis Hallett, of Washington, D. C., is superintendent in charge of the factory and is getting everything in first class order. The factory is now running at the rate of eight tons of ice per day, and will soon turn out fifteen tons per day.

Henderson Gold Leaf: Dr. J. R. Moss, the white man who was given the appointment of postmaster at Henderson upon condition that he would take the negro, Dr. Pope, in as his assistant, took charge of the office last evening. When he went in all the former officials and employees went out. Not one of them—postmaster Hicks, his son, J. F. Hicks, Mr. R. B. Henderson, former postmaster and who has been assisting Mr. Hicks since his appointment, and Badger Barroughs, who has been in the office several years—would remain when the negro went in.

Fayetteville Observer: We have heard of "the old woman who lived in a shoe, and had so many children she didn't know what to do," but if we have been correctly informed, there is little doubt that Mr. David Canble, of Stauky county, is the father of more children than any other man in North Carolina. He has been married only once and to the union thirty two children have been born. Fourteen boys and eleven girls are now living, and five boys and two girls being dead. Mr. Canble is eighty years old. His wife is also living.

Charlotte News: Mr. Gus Jarrett, a brother-in-law of Mr. H. S. Puryear, of Concord, died suddenly at his home in Yadkin county, last Monday, from an attack of apoplexy. Mr. Jarrett was one of the most prominent citizens of Yadkin, and was well known throughout this section. T. R. Davis, a young man who was last year in the employ of the Richmond & Danville Railroad as fireman, has brought suit against that company for \$25,000 damages. Davis was firing on the road when his engine collided with a freight train. One of Davis' legs was so badly broken that it had to be amputated. He states in his complaint that his spine was also injured.

Charlotte Chronicle: W. P. Eife, the drummer evangelist, will begin a series of meetings at Concord next Sunday week. — Thomas W. Sparrow died at Davidson College last Saturday, and was buried Sunday. He was 77 years of age, and was for a long time one of the most prominent citizens of the county. — R. W. Titman, of Mt. Holly, has made an assignment. Several Charlotte firms are interested, but not for large amounts. — Mrs. Margra Allen will arrive here to day from Salisbury. Mrs. Allen is an Englishwoman, who was bequeathed, by her husband at his death, \$1,000,000 to be used in mission work among the colored people. Mrs. Allen has been in this country a year or more, devoting her time and fortune to the work specified, and her visit here is in the interest of the colored race. — Yesterday a little fellow who attends the graded school emptied his pockets of the following articles: One kid glove, one handkerchief, a pair of bones, a whistle, one pop gun, an iron ring, a horse shoe magnet, a number of tobacco tags, a file, an iron chain, an iron bolt, one pocket knife, a lead pencil, two slate pencils, a bullet, 75 rubber bands, some rabbit tobacco and a cigarette stump.

NORTH CAROLINA Car Service Association,
RALEIGH, N. C., January 15th, 1890.
To all Consignors and Consignees of Freight:
A serious loss and much inconvenience have been caused, both to shippers and railroad companies, by the unnecessary detention of cars in loading and unloading freights. Shippers are often unable to procure cars, tracks are encumbered, and the speedy movement of freight is impossible under the practices that have prevailed. The railroad companies feel obliged, therefore, to endeavor to correct this evil, and have issued the notice printed below.

The system thus established has been in force at a number of important points during the past year, with advantageous results in every instance. The amount charged is not sufficient to recompense the companies for the use of their cars, tracks, etc., for warehouse purposes, and is not collected for the purpose of revenue, but for the prevention of abuses which affect both the public and the transportation lines.
The rules will be enforced without discrimination by the North Carolina Car Service Association, which will act for all interests alike.

Notice.
Notice is hereby given that on and after March 1st, 1890, cars remaining unloaded for twenty-eight (28) hours, after being placed for delivery, shall be subject to a charge of one dollar (\$1.00) per day, or fraction thereof, for detention of cars and use of tracks.
If cars be consigned to private sidings, and such sidings be already full, or if consigned to general delivery tracks, and the prompt placing of cars be prevented by the presence of cars belonging to the same consignee held under load for more than forty-eight (48) hours, it shall be considered that they have been placed for delivery at the time of arrival at the yard or siding where held.
Forty-eight (48) hours will be allowed for loading empty cars after being placed in position, after which time the Car Service rate of one dollar (\$1.00) per day, or fraction thereof, for detention and use of tracks will be applied. Sundays and legal holidays are excepted in the computation of time of detention of cars and use of tracks.
