Death of Mr. W. Cotten Downing. We are sorry to hear of the death of Mr. W. Cotten Downing, a gentleman who is known to many here where he resided for a few months last year. For some years he contributed verses to the REVIEW. He died in Asheville last Thursday night.

Mr. Downing was born in the Eastern part of the State and was a lawyer by profession. From Wilmington he removed to Pittsburg, Pa., and at the time of his death was traveling correspondent for a paper published in that city. His remains were taken to Pittsburg for interment.

Death of Mr. T. B. Henderson. Mr. Thos. B. Henderson, a highly esteemed resident of this city, died at his residence here at 8:30 o'clock this morning, aged 45 years. Mr. Henderson was a native of Onslow county but had long been a resident of Wilmington. He was a gallant Confederate soldier, serving in Co. H, 3d N. C. Cavalry, and was a member of the New Hanover Confederate Veteran's Association. He leaves a young wife and one child, a mere infant, to mourn their irreparable loss. He was a strict member of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church and the funeral services will take place from that church to-morrow morning, at 11 o'clock.

Basics Better than Bullets. We find in the New York Herald, of Saturday's date, a highly sensational report of an affair that is said to have recently taken place. It is dated from Columbia, S. C. There may be some truth in the affair, but we doubt it. At all events it is probable that the localities are wrong, Columbus county, N. C. and Marlboro county, S. C. would seem more reasonable than Bladen and Darlington. The report is as follows:

A sensational affair is reported from Bladen county, N. C. For some time past Joseph Ellar has been paying devoted attention to Miss Mamie Cuthbert, the pretty daughter of T. M. Cuthbert. About a month ago it was reported that the two were engaged and soon to be married. Suddenly Ellar ceased to visit Miss Cuthbert. Her father questioned her about the matter. She broke down and told a tale which so enraged her father, that he swore vengeance against the young man.

Placing two large revolvers in his pocket, Cuthbert started in search of Ellar. Meeting a friend of the young man he told his intentions to him. This friend begged Cuthbert to give Ellar a chance. Cuthbert thereupon agreed to fight a duel with pistols.

Ellar was found and agreed to meet Cuthbert on the "field of honor," Darlington county, South Carolina, was selected as the place of meeting. The seconds were chosen and on Wednesday morning the two men set out, each being accompanied by a friend. They traveled on horseback and arrived at the appointed place on the same day about 4 o'clock. Their friends examined the pistols to be used and were ready to step off the pace when Ellar spoke. Looking Cuthbert in the face, he asked:

"What is all this about?" "You have deceived and ruined my daughter, sir," warmly replied Cuthbert.

"How have I deceived her?" "In that you proposed to her and now decline to marry her."

For a moment Ellar stood perfectly still. "Mr. Cuthbert," said he, "I love your daughter and if you will forgive me for having wronged you and her I am now ready to make her a good and faithful husband."

This proposition was agreed to and the two men fired their revolvers in the air. All parties again mounted their horses and rode back home. They arrived there about 9 o'clock and a preacher was sent for, while another party went for the license. Ellar and Miss Cuthbert were made man and wife without further delay.
