This was done through the loving kindness and tender regard of the women of Fredericksburg. Those wooden headboards are now decay ing and stones are needed to mark the graves. Of all of the Southern States Georgia alone has responded and she sent the stones to mark the resting place of her heroic dead North Carolina was appealed to through letters written to Governor Fowle, but no satisfactory response was received. The matter will be taken in hand here and it is hoped that a part, at least, of the stones, or their value, will be contributed in Wilmington. We feel sure that the response here will be a noble and a liberal one.
