A fair rep resentation, it says, in the State House of Representatives on the vote cast would be 125 Republicans and 115 Democrats. The figures are -161 Republicans and 79 Democrats.

The present flood in the Mississippi Valley is the highest of which there is any trustworthy record, says the New York Times, but that is not the most remarkable thing about it. It comes after a season which was marked by the lowest water ever known. Last New Year's Day as far north as Iowa there was no more ice in the Mississippi than in the Hudson at Albany-which is to say there was none at all. And the water in the Mississippi there was two inches below the record in 1864. At Rock Island the water was eighteen inches below low water, and there was fear of a famine in houses and mills. The low water and mild winter together point irresistibly to the con clusion that the snow and ice which usually form the sources of the spring freshets ran away as the rain fell, draining the country dry. That leaves the present floods to be accounted for. The weather observer attributes it to irrigation, which he thinks is now on such a scale as to produce the climatic changes. The Louisiana press has another explanation. It declares that the progressive settlement of the North west has led to the drainage of entire districts and the destruction of forests over thousands of square miles.
