## Harbor Master's Report.

From the books of Capt. Joseph Price, Harbor Master, we get the following report of arrivals at this port during the month of March:

American—7 steamers, 5,391 tons; 14 schooners, 3,671 tons; total 21 vessels and 9,062 tons.

Foreign—1 steamer, 1,385 tons; 5 barges, 2,484 tons; 3 brigs, 794 tons; 3 schooners, 379 tons. Total arrivals American and foreign 33 vessels, aggregating 13,101 tons.

## The Fire This Morning.

The alarm of fire this morning, at 4 o'clock, turned in from box 35, was caused by the burning of the roof of a one story frame dwelling on Eighth, between Dock and Orange streets, owned by Mr. J. H. Turner and occupied by Mollie Williams, colored. The house was partially destroyed and the furniture almost entirely so. There was no insurance on the house but the furniture was insured with Messrs. Atkinson & Manning, in the City of London, for \$250.

## New to Many.

The plant known as "the veiled nun," not "the nun's veil," is indigenous to this part of North Carolina as well as to South America. It grows wild in meadow lands near Wilmington. This is news to many, but it is a fact. The "ageratum Mexicana," supposed to be native only to Mexico, grows spontaneously in this State. We have found the blue growing wild on the banks of the Roanoke river and the white grows profusely in various localities around this city. We have gathered great masses of it in an afternoon's ride.

## Meteorological.

Mr. F. P. Chaffee, Signal Service Observer in charge, furnishes the following summary of the weather conditions in March, viz:

The mean barometer was 30.12; the highest, 30.53 on the 10th; the lowest, 29.76 on the 28th.

The mean temperature was 53°; highest, 77° on the 26th; lowest, 22° on the 16th. The total deficiency in temperature during the month was 35°; the total excess in temperature since January 1st last, 530°.

The prevailing direction of the wind was southwest, and the total movement 733 miles; the highest velocity was 36 miles, on the 22d.

The total rainfall was 1.05 inches; and the number of rainy days was 11. There was a deficiency of precipitation during the month of 2.87 inches; the total deficiency since January 1st being 7.34 inches.

Frost occurred on the 3d, 16th and 17th; and a thunder storm on the 20th.

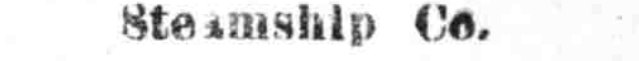
