Board of Aldermen.

The Board met Saturday evening and awarded bids as follows:
For city printing to S. G. Hall, at \$43.

For lumber, to Parsley & Wiggins at \$10 per thousand feet.

For feeding prisoners, to Jane Sheehan, at 8 cents per meal.

For lights, to the Gas and Electric Light Co., as heretofore.

For feeding mules, care of carts, etc., to T. J. Southerland, at \$30 per month for each cart.

Estimates were adopted as follows:
For police, \$18,000; lights, \$7,380; markets, \$5,815, including \$2,000 for repairs to Front Street Market; fire department, \$12,600; sanitary department, \$7,350; hospital managers, \$1,450; for investigations and surveys looking to a sewerage system \$2,000.

Easter Sunday.

We had here a bright, pleasant Easter Sunday, albeit rather cool. The congregations at all the churches were very large. The services were very impressive, the floral adornments were elegant and profuse, the music was all delightful and the offerings were large. In St. James' Church they were very large and in St. John's they were about sufficient to pay off the last cent of indebtedness—floating indebtedness, by the way, brought over from last year and cancelled this Easter. In this church there was a very delightful choral service in the afternoon which was largely attended. The children of the Sunday school made their offerings, amounting in the aggregate to nearly \$100, which is to be applied to Diocesan Missions. This Sunday school, by the way, is larger and in a more flourishing condition than it has been for years past, a result which is due, in a large measure, to the incessant labors of the Superintendent, Prof. Washington Catlett, and his excellent methods and discipline.

Board of Magistrates.

A meeting of the justices of the Peace for New Hanover county was held at the Court House this morning. The roll call showed that 31 justices were present.

Dr. W. W. Harriss, the chairman, declared a quorum present and called the meeting to order, and then requested Mr. H. A. Bagg, Chairman of the Board of County Commissioners, who was present, to state the object for which they had been called together. This Mr. Bagg did, saying that they were called for the purpose of taking measures to authorize the construction of a new poor house and house of correction in the place of those destroyed by fire recently.

There was considerable discussion in regard to a site for the buildings but it was finally decided, by a unanimous vote, and on the motion of Justice Green, seconded by Justice Reilly, that the present locality be retained.

On motion of Justice Green, seconded by Justice Cantwell, it was resolved that the Board of Magistrates authorize the Board of County Commissioners to appropriate a sum not exceeding \$17,500 for the construction of a poor house and other necessary buildings.

On motion of Justice Bunting the Board then adjourned.
