Russia is interested in the statistics of Tushkuroff, a traveller and ethnologist, who points out the fact that there are 400,000 heathens and 50,000 Mohammedans in the Russian army, the latter forming 75 per cent. of the Cossack regiments, and also declares that Christianity is dying out in Southeastern Russia.

The South is producing more cotton than when she had millions of slaves at her command, and astonishing as it may be to most of people who have not kept pace with her progress, from producing less than one eighth of the country's iron nine years ago, to-day she is producing about one-fourth of all the iron made in the United States.

The Washington Democrat says that if every Republican leader in Congress were pledged to do all in his power to elect a Democratic President in 1892 the outlook for our success in that campaign would not be better. More vigor to you all, agents of the monopolists and surplus grabbers! You are making Democratic voters by the thousand every day in the week.

Some time ago a woman's club, said to be the first of the kind in this country, was organized in New York, and now one has been organized in Philadelphia. It is composed of some of the most aristocratic women of that city, and classes in reading, musical instruction, sewing and cooking will be formed. At a few of the entertainments a limited number of gentlemen will be admitted.

The figures quoted in the German Budget for the coming year show the effective army as consisting of 19,737 officers, 468,409 non-commissioned officers and privates, 1,769 military doctors, 22 chemists, 534 veterinarians, 856 paymasters and bandmasters, 17,382 officers' chargers, 88,802 horses for privates, and 4,256 extra horses. The total cost is given at £18,967,943, in addition to a sum of £11,755,988 extra expenditure upon new barracks, store-houses, and the equipment of two new army corps which are being formed in Lorraine and upon the frontier of Russia.

The Republican majority in Congress, says the Charleston News and Courier, are piling up campaign issues at an altogether satisfactory rate for the Democrats. Speaker Reed's rulings upon the organization of the House will be good material for many a ringing speech. The work of the House Committees on Elections will put the ousted Democrats on their mettle. The public buildings raids will make the taxpayers in those States think twice before they cast Republican votes. The pension steals will divide the vote of the Grand Army of the Republic—brave soldiers are not thieves. The admission of new States to the Union to swell the Republican strength in the Senate and Electoral College will not gain Republican candidates many votes among the older members of the National family. Give them rope enough and they will hang themselves.

Since 1868 there has grown up in Key West, Fla., a very enterprising and successful manufacture of cigars from Havana tobacco. From a very small beginning and against great difficulties it has made its way; it turns out about 100,000,000 cigars annually, pays \$5,000,000 a year in wages, and supports 25,000 people. It is strictly and necessarily an American industry. Its materials are imported, heavily taxed, and the value put into them is solely that of labor in the United States. This industry the new tariff bill, which imposes a prohibitory duty on leaf tobacco would be substituted for foreign tobacco suitable for wrappers, would simply wipe out of existence. The pretext is that American tobacco as wrappers, and that is probably sincerely believed by the authors of the bill. It is a mistake, but even if it were possible what right has Congress, to benefit one class, thus cruelly and wantonly to injure another?
