The Tennessee Democratic Convention to nominate a candidate for Governor will be held on the 15th of July. There are already several aspirants in the field. The candidates will have plenty of time to look after their fences.

Whatever history may ultimately say about the Salvation Army it is nevertheless a highly significant fact that in the year 1890 2,000,000 people, mainly of Protestant antecedents, have found the established churches inadequate to satisfy their religious instinct and have formed by far the most earnest, the most active and the most rapidly spreading religious movement which has characterized the nineteenth century.

We appeal most frantically to Reed and Boss Quay and little Benny Harrison to do something at once to save the G. O. P. from instant and complete and irrevocable destruction. It is going to the denunciation bow wows about as fast as the juggernaut at Washington City can travel there with it. Turning out a few legally elected Senators and Representatives to make room for rabid partisans will not do. The work is too slow. They must go in for it by the wholesale, a la Clarkson, and turn out every Democrat in Congress at Washington City. When this is done they must enlarge their philacteries and turn the whole Democratic party out. In fact, that party is already turning out. They turned out in big force this week and carried the election field handsomely in several States. The prospect is a good one for them. Ohio endorses the party; Chicago has gone beautifully Democratic; Rhode Island has an excellent prospect of gaining a Democratic governor; Helena, Mont., endorses the rightful result in the State election of October last by electing a mayor and six out of eight aldermen; Jersey City has given Mayor Cleveland his third term by a big majority; twenty towns in Ohio show substantial Democratic gains and in most of them elect the ticket; in Hoboken the Democrats make a clean sweep of everything; in Michigan they have carried four towns heretofore solidly Republican and in Albany Jas. H. Manning, son of the late Hon. Dan, Manning, was elected Mayor by a majority larger than his opponent's actual vote. Yes, gentlemen, some heroic measures must be at once adopted to save the G. O. P. from utter and complete annihilation.

The Encampment Meeting.  
A meeting of citizens interested in securing the permanent location of the encampment grounds at Wrightsville met at the Produce Exchange at noon to-day. The meeting was largely attended and a great deal of interest was manifested in the matter. Col. John W. Atkinson presided and Capt. R. M. McIntire was made Secretary. The exact status of the affair was stated by the chairman and it was made known that about \$2,000 is needed to complete the sum originally agreed upon. Atkinson, has decided to name ten gentlemen on this committee but the list will probably not be completed until to-morrow. It was not ready, at all events, in time for publication in this issue.
