The imports at New York from foreign ports for the month of March have been nearly three million dollars in excess of the corresponding month of the previous year. The gain is all on the free list.

Our neighbor of the *Star* says that President Harrison has turned out 30,000 Democrats since he has been in office. He has done better than that. He turned out lots of them in Ohio and Indiana and Illinois and New Jersey and New York and Rhode Island, as recent elections show.

There was a municipal election in Butte, Mon., on Monday and the only issue was as to whether the people would sustain the action of the canvassing board in throwing out precinct 34 in the late State election. The vote was for seven aldermen and a mayor and the Democrats won a handsome victory.

"Nine thousand Republicans failed to vote." This is the news from Cleveland, Ohio, via Republican lines. It is simply terrible. If true it justifies the divorce of Ohio from the Republican column, which has lately been so affectionately and effectually effected. It is in order now for John Sherman to call for a committee of investigation and condolence.

Miss Annie Heaslitt Gould, daughter of the late Thomas Gould, a noted young society woman, a graduate of Wells College and a friend of Mrs. Grover Cleveland, has run away and married George L. Winter, her coachman. She left him the next day. She took a Summary of the situation and found that the Winter of her discontent did not delay its coming.

Mr. Randall died a poor man. His estate, it is said, will not exceed \$10,000, all told. There is a fund, however, of \$50,000 which was raised some little time back through the exertions of the noble-hearted Geo. W. Childs and offered to Mr. Randall. He positively refused to accept it, but the funds were held in hand and will now be tendered to Mrs. Randall, with the hope that she will accept them.

The Celebration.
 The two trains on the Cape Fear & Yadkin Valley R. R. or, rather, the two sections of one train, came in yesterday on time, the first arriving here at 6.10 and the other at 6.30. A delegation from the committee on celebrating the event was on hand to receive them and a large number of citizens, among whom were many ladies, were also assembled on the wharf. Each delegation was handed a white ribbon badge as he landed on the dock. There were about four hundred in all on the two trains and it took two steamers, the *Compton* and the *Murchison*, to bring them over to the city. As the boats left the wharf at Point Peter the excursionists were greeted with a salvo of artillery from the revenue cutter *Colfax*, as she lay in the stream, with all of her bunting displayed. Some few other excursionists came in this morning and others will probably arrive this afternoon.

The sudden change in the weather does not seem to have seriously interfered with the enjoyment of our visitors. The *Passport* left here this morning at 10 o'clock with a large crowd on board for Carolina Beach. She was literally packed with people. About all who desired to go down were accommodated on her and the *Murchison* was not sent out.
