Since the great fire at Seattle last June permits have been granted for 1,845 new buildings that will cost \$6,693,000.

Norfolk Virginian: The Rhode Island election probably had more to do with the final erasure of the hide tax from the McKinley bill than any other influence. There will be other elections in Republican States with the same result, and it is not impossible that within ten years the Republican party will be demanding free trade.

John W. Davis, the Democrat who will be the next Governor of Rhode Island, says: "The business men of this State are for Tariff Reform, which benefits them. The Republicans find that they can expect nothing from their party now in power, as the West, with its iron, wood and coal magnates, has been favored, while the East has suffered."

New York Star: With the exception of little Hamilton and Lewis and, of course, the big cities of New York and Brooklyn, all parts of the State have now filed completed returns of the town elections. The Democrats have elected 543 Supervisors and the Republicans 668 of these officials and the Democrats only 443. The transfer of 101 votes in the Boards of Supervisors is a Democratic gain of 10 per cent. in a single year. The State is now practically tied between the two parties, outside the great Democratic cities, and the Democratic majority in them may be counted as net majority in the entire Commonwealth. Still more significant is the change in the control of the local Boards. Last year the Democrats had the majority of Supervisors in only seventeen counties, while the Republicans controlled thirty-six Boards and three were tied. Now the County Boards stand: Democratic twenty-eight, Republican twenty-four and four evenly divided.

The New Fifth Street Church.
The work on the beautiful new Fifth Street M. E. Church is rapidly approaching completion. Some little changes in the plans have, however, been found necessary. One of these is the raising of the roof of the organ recess, so as to receive that instrument. The organ will be a very handsome one and it, together with a chime of nine bells, will be presented to the church by Mr. John C. Davis. The organ will cost \$3,500 and the bells from \$2,300 to \$2,500 more.

The church, when completed, will be one of the handsomest in the State, and a decided accession to the architectural beauty of the city. Mr. Porter, who has had charge of the work, has given universal satisfaction. He is making a big reputation for himself, also, and parties in Greensboro have already written to him in reference to building a new church in that city.

Some information as to the price of ice in this and other cities will prove of interest to our readers at this time.

In Richmond, for 100 pounds and under, 1 1/2 cents per pound; over 100 pounds 90 cents per hundred.

In Petersburg the same prices prevail as in Richmond.

In Norfolk, for 100 pounds and under, 1 cent per pound.

In Philadelphia, for 10 to 25 pounds each day, 95 cents per hundred; 25 to 50 pounds each day, 90 cents per hundred; by the ton, \$10.

In New York, for less than 25 pounds, 1 cent per pound; under 500 pounds, 80 cents per hundred; by the ton, \$10.

In Fall River, Mass., under 100 pounds, 1 1/2 cents per pound; for 100 to 500 pounds, 90 cents per hundred.

In Wilmington, 1 cent per pound and same prices for small quantities as prevailed last Summer. For 100 to 2,000 pounds, 50 cents per hundred.
