**The May Belford.**

*Belford's Magazine* for May is at hand. It has been here for a week or more, in fact, but as *Belford's* is our favorite monthly we generally read it all before making up a report on its merits. There is an excellent variety in this number. The opening paper, "Congressional Power on Education and Elections," by B. J. Sage, discusses carefully and candidly, and free from party bias, the proposed interference by Congress with the rights of the States, in the matter of controlling the Congressional elections; "Hearts and Coronets," by Lieut. Col. J. E. Warburton, is a pretty little story; "Historical Vindication of Secession" is from the pen of our late chief, Ex-President Jefferson Davis, and is just what its title purports—an absolute vindication of the right which *did* exist for the secession of the States. Laura F. Hinsdale gives us a delightful sketch of Charles Gayarre; "Brunette Preferred" is a readable little story; "The Silver Question" is discussed by Senator Stewart; "Books Worthy of Note" are discussed by Admiral Porter and Julius Henri Brown; "Stronger than Death" is a pathetic little story of love and lepers, and "Free Trade in the United States" is the prize papers on political questions. The editorials are, as usual, forceful and vigorous; the poems are by Emma C. Dowd, H. B. Serrey and Walter H. Hayne and the reviews, book notices and humorous departments will be found as full and as entertaining as usual. *Belford's Magazine*, New York, at \$2.50 a year.

**The Closing Scenes.**

The W. L. I. Festival closed in a blaze of glory on Saturday night, about 11 o'clock. Munds' pretty little pink-toed darling. At night there were about 500 visitors and a repetition of the Fan Drill and of the gymnastic exercises. The Art Gallery was again the Mecca of all who love the beautiful in art as well as in nature and the refreshment booths and the other stalls were liberally patronized. The receipts, after the necessary expenses are all defrayed, will be turned over to the Armory Fund, which will then be well on the way towards the \$5,000 mark.

### BRANCH DEPOT.

**The Robert Portner Brewing Company's Branch to Open To-Morrow—Beer Bottled and Soda Water, Sarsaparilla, Ginger Ale and All Kinds of Mineral Waters Manufactured.**

The new plant of the Robert Portner Brewing Co., known as the Wilmington Branch, will be formally opened to-morrow. The works are located at the corner of Brunswick and Eighth streets, adjoining the W. & W. and W. C. & A. R. R. tracks, just at the junction of the Seacoast Road. A branch track leads out from the main line up to the doors of the depot and freight can thus be taken on or off directly from the warehouse to the cars.

The new plant consists of cold storage for beer and bottling facilities for the same, with new and improved machinery for the manufacture of all kinds of soda water, sarsaparilla, ginger ale and mineral waters.

The building is of brick, a story and a half in height and 40x70 feet in size. The ice house will hold three car loads of beer, equal to 250 barrels or 10,000 gallons, and 30 tons of ice. The beer is kept here in kegs until ready for the bottlers, and at a uniform temperature of 35 degrees. The office is located on the first floor and on this there are also the bottling machines, all of new and late designs, and the machinery for the manufacture of the soda and mineral waters. These last are of the well known manufacture of John Matthews, New York, and are fitted with all of the latest improvements. The capacity of these works is 100 gallons to each charge.

All of the works are run by steam, a beautiful little marine engine, of 12 horse power, furnishing the motive.

The second floor of the building is occupied for storage of crates, bottles, &c. There are 1,000 crates there now and there is room for 6,000 in all.

Back of the main building is found the stables, with stalls for six horses. This is the number of animals employed. There are four wagons in all—the new "three-decker" requiring two horses to pull it and the others one. The sixth horse, a beautiful iron gray, is reserved for buggy use.

There will be no down-town depot hereafter but Messrs. Adrian & Vollers have kindly consented to receive orders and see that they are promptly handed in.

We congratulate the Portner Brewing Co. on the business success they have achieved here and this auspicious opening of a new era, but chiefly most our congratulations be extended to Mr. E. Kuhblank, the earnest, intelligent and courteous gentleman who has for three years past had charge of the business here and under whose skillful and wise management it has grown to such handsome proportions.

In all, the works here give employment now to 17 persons, seven white and ten colored, and the prospect is that more will soon be needed. Mr. Kuhblank's staff is enumerated as follows:

E. Coleman, soda manufacturer; John E. Taylor, J. Mohr and J. Kelley, delivery clerks; Geo. H. Davis, engineer; Jos. W. Brown, (for many years past with Capt. T. J. Southland) stable keeper.
