Probably few of them understand that the Government of the Free State is so nearly nominal that great numbers of slaves are annually sold to its people merely for eating and to be killed at the funerals of their owners. No other sovereign in the world is supposed to have so many cannibals in some sense under his authority as good King Leopold.
