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
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

A Good Outlook for Hudson River Fruit. The outlook for a large yield of high and low vine fruits in the Hudson river valley, between Barrytown and Cornwall, is promising. Fruit men who are tving and pruning vines say that unless a wet season is experienced in June, the strawberry crop will be beyond the average harvests in past seasons. The Antwerp raspberry canes are healthy and give evidence of an abundant crop. The peach crop has been more or less injured. There are many orchards in southern Ulster that will not yield more than a

bushel of fully matured fruit. Other

orchards in Marlborough, Clintondale,

Highland and New Paltz will yield 25

per cent. of a full crop. Many of the trees are now in blossom, which confirms the statement of painstaking horticulturists, made early in March, that the Hudson river peach crop will not be a complete failure this season unless unlooked for atmospheric changes are experienced. It is yet too early to predict the ontput of grapes. Fruit growers are taking every precaution demanded for the proper care of the vines, and the disease which proved so disastrous to the crop last season is believed to have been cured by the application of remedies especially prepared for the vine. 
