Gone to Richmond.

The Wilmington Light Infantry left here last night for Richmond with 40 men, rank and file, and accompanied by Col. W. C. Jones and Adjutant Harris, of the Second Regiment, N. C. S. G., and Col. Jno. L. Cantwell, Commissary-General. The expenses of the trip were contributed by a number of public-spirited citizens. They were due in Richmond about 7 o'clock this morning and probably arrived there at that hour. They will remain there two days and expect to leave on the return to-morrow night, arriving here early on Friday morning.

Some More About Ice.

It seems that we were not very far out in our estimate yesterday as to the cost of ice. From Mr. W. E. Worth we learn that in an average year it costs about \$3 a ton to make it, which is the figure we gave. Delivered at 50 cents per 100 pounds and allowing 25 per cent. for melting and 10 per cent. for shrinkage and loss in cutting this amounts to \$6.40 per ton, out of which there is to be deducted the expenses of delivery. Ice sold at \$5 per ton by the carload equals delivery in the city at 50 cents per 100 pounds.

There are only four months in the year when the manufacture of ice here is a paying business and these are June, July, August and September; there are four months, April and May and October and November, when there is no profit and in the remaining four, December, January, February and March, there is an actual loss, unless there is an entire cessation of business. The factory cannot be closed during the cold months but must be kept open the year round and the expense of maintaining it in the winter is nearly equal that of the summer.

Maj. McClammy's Big Bill.

Hon. C. W. McClammy, Representative in Congress from our neighboring district, the Third, the same, by the way, of which it was said (on the authority of the *DAILY REVIEW*) that the news of his first nomination found him stripping fodder in his field, *a la Cincinnati*, yesterday introduced in the House a bill which combines the prominent features of the Stanford Land Loan and the Blair Educational Aid bills. It authorizes the issue of legal tender notes to the amount of \$1,800,000,000. The notes are to be legal tenders for all purposes except the payment of interest on the public debt. They are to be distributed among the various States, according to population, and are then to be loaned to the people upon mortgages. The loans will bear interest at the nominal rate of one per cent. per annum. Not more than \$2,500 are to be loaned to any one person, and preference is given to those whose lands are already mortgaged, to the end that they may take up high interest bearing liens on their property. Mr. McClammy hopes to have his bill substituted for the Farmers' Alliance Grain Sub-treasury bill, now before the Committee on Ways and Means.
