Portrait of Hon. James Iredell.

Raleigh News and Observer: The picture of James Iredell, of North Carolina, who was an Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States, has been presented to our Supreme Court by Mr. Iredell Meares, of Wilmington, grandson of the distinguished jurist. It is an etching copied from a small painting in Mr. Meares' possession, and was executed by Mr. Albert Rosenthal, of Philadelphia, who is an artist of reputation, and whose services have been engaged for the purpose of collecting and preparing the pictures (in this mode of engraving) of the Justices of the United States Supreme Court, which are to illustrate "The Lives of the Justices of the Supreme Court," a book now in the course of preparation. This picture of Judge Iredell is said to be a very good one, and it is gratifying to note the increasing interest of our people in preserving memorials of our distinguished men.

The Excursion To-Day.

The excursion of the Y. M. C. A. to Carolina Beach to-day was largely attended. The Grove carried down about 150 at 9:30 o'clock, and at 2:30. She had about 400 on board, including the W. L. I., who went down to the Beach for their annual target practice this afternoon. It is probable that a large number will also go down this evening, at 7 o'clock, on the last trip. The moon will rise about the time the last party arrives at the Beach. It has been a fine day for a trip to the seaside.

The Baccalaureate at Chapel Hill.

The Baccalaureate sermon at the University of North Carolina, on Sunday last, was preached by Rev. Robert Sfrange, of this city, and a correspondent of the Raleigh News and Observer says that it was very able and delivered in fine style to a large and most attentive congregation. Leaflets containing the service for Trinity Sunday were distributed for the convenience of those not familiar with Episcopal forms. The text was "Seek ye first the Kingdom of God and his righteousness and all these things shall be added to you." He enforced this with such strength of language and beauty of metaphor and aptness of illustration and well-told examples taken from the lives of devoted Christian philanthropists that many old citizens said, "it is the best sermon we ever heard." They were forcibly reminded of the presence and political triumphs gained by his father, Col. Robert Strange, and his grandfather, Judge Robert Strange, and rejoiced that such talents and eloquence are given to the service of Christ. All the friends of the University are triumphant at the success of one of its boys who graduated only eleven years ago. The singing was excellent, led by a choir of students with Dr. Weaver at the organ.

Homestead and Loan Association.

The fourth annual meeting of the Wilmington Homestead and Loan Association was held last night at the City Hall, with Mr. C. H. Robinson in the chair, and Mr. C. C. Brown secretary. The annual report of the President was read as follows: To the stockholders of the Wilmington Homestead and Loan Association: The year that has passed since our last meeting has been a prosperous one with our association, and the report of the condition, made by our secretary and treasurer, will, we think, be satisfactory to all. An additional series of 500 shares was issued June 1st, 1889, and was promptly taken up, and during the year loans have been made on 301 of these shares, and 30 retired, leaving only 169 free shares in this third series. An amendment passed at our last annual meeting allowing stockholders to withdraw or retire shares, and to receive three-fourths of the earnings of the stock, has resulted in the retiring of quite a number of shares, mostly in the first series. An amendment will be proposed at this meeting to allow the directors to force the withdrawal or retiring of the shares of non-borrowers pro rata on the number of shares held by each one in case money accumulates and cannot be loaned, paying to each share retired the full earnings to the date of the retiring or to the first of the quarter preceding. I think this amendment should be so worded as to allow the directors to retire shares offered and pay the full earnings instead of three-fourths as now allowed. This would probably obviate any necessity of forcing any retiring of stock. It is clearly better to adopt this for borrowers and non-borrowers, than to allow money to lie idle. If there are sufficient borrowers to use the money, no necessity will exist to retire shares—either voluntary or by forcing. The directors have carefully considered this subject in view of the multiplying of associations, both home organizations and those from other States. We think the working of our association proves it to be the safest method yet devised for borrowers and investors, and we think home organizations under the management of our citizens should be encouraged, and all outside associations, that promise large returns, should be carefully investigated before our people put their money in them. Promises are easily made, but not always fulfilled. Since this association has been

started not a dollar has been lost, the expense of conducting it has been very small, and the result you can see by the statement made. Whether outside organizations can do better—as they must do to fulfill their promises—is a question for every one interested to decide. One change has been made in the Board of Directors, Mr. Frank H. Stedman having resigned and Mr. A. D. Brown being elected in his place. Respectfully, C. H. ROBINSON, President.

The report of the Treasurer showed that the net earnings of the three series amount respectively to nine and one-tenth, ten and six-tenths, and sixteen per cent. per annum on the amount paid in. An amendment was adopted to the constitution, as follows: "That when it shall appear necessary to reduce the number of shares not loaned upon in any of the series, the directors may, by a two-thirds vote, compel the redemption of unpledged shares; such redemption to be made by calling in from each non-borrower his or her proportion of the number of shares to be retired; provided, that all stock so retired shall receive the full profits earned by the same up to the date of retirement. All shareholders shall be considered non-borrowers who have not a real estate or stock loan of three-fourths of the amount actually paid to the association."

After the re-election of the present board and a vote of thanks to the officers for their prosperous management of the affairs of the association the meeting adjourned.

Commencing on Friday, the 6th inst., and on every Friday thereafter until October 1st, the banks in this city will close at 12 o'clock, thus giving their employes a weekly half-holiday during the Summer season.
