The eighth woman to be admitted to the bar of the United States Supreme Court is Kate Kane, of Chicago.

The thermometer was 93 in the shade at New York on Wednesday. And yet we think it is hot here when it gets up to 85.

A Jewish synagogue to be erected in Baltimore will, it is said, be the only specimen of pure Byzantine architecture in the United States.

The agricultural college professors have figured it out that two little sparrows in ten years will produce an ancestry of 275,716,983,698 birds.

Quill toothpicks, as a rule, are imported from France. The largest factory in the world is near Paris, where 20,000,000 are annually produced.

Lord Selbourne sadly admits to the Church Defense Association of England that disestablishment has come "within the range of practical politics."

The British Museum received one day last week a Chinese bank note issued from the Imperial mint 300 years before the first use of paper money in England.

A fine ledge of lithographic stone has been discovered near City Creek, Salt Lake. It has been tested in New York, and pronounced equal to the stone of Bavaria.

The business of the Transcaspian Railway has reached a value of 120,000 rubles (about \$65,000) per week, chiefly from cotton, which is now largely cultivated in Central Asia.

Locusts are so numerous in some parts of South Australia that they cause a continual roar while flying, and the country is being stripped of everything green by the scourge.

Electric traction is said to be fairly booming in London. In a few weeks a line of omnibuses run by electricity is to be started. They will be driven by storage batteries, and will have a seating capacity for twenty six passengers.

The coldest region in the United States is the stretch of country on the northern border of the Minnesota lakes to the western line of Dakota. At Pembina the lowest temperature reached was 56° below zero, and this was reached in the winter of 1873.

At a meeting of Baptists in Chicago, to raise funds for their university, Dr. Goodspeed announced contributions of \$27,000 from the Jews of that city, whereupon there was enthusiastic applause, followed by the singing of "Ye Chosen Seed of Israel's Race."

The already remarkable efficient cab service in London has been improved by the recent appearance of a great number of light, graceful and pretty coupes. They are made on an entirely new plan, and are designed to supersede the clumsy four wheeled cabs now in vogue there.

A quick-firing gun, the invention of Mr. Thronsen, was tested recently at Finspong, in Sweden. The results showed that ten shots can be fired within 25 seconds, which is 24 shots a minute. All the shots were true, and hit the target within a space of nine inches long and six inches wide.

A metal has been produced that will melt at a temperature of 150 degrees. It is an alloy composed of lead, tin, bismuth and cadmium, and in weight, hardness and color resembles type metal. It melts so easily that, placed on a comparatively cool part of the stove with a piece of paper under it, it will melt without the paper being scorched.

An insect pest called the "aphis" has been causing great destruction on the Pacific coast, but now it is discovered that the ladybug (*adalia bipunctata*) is very busily engaged in eating up the aphis. The ladybug is a charming creature, well known to literature and to folklore, and it is especially pleasant to learn that it has gone into a useful business.

Rev. Dr. Dixon on Shepard.

Rev. Thomas Dixon, Jr., a native of North Carolina, and pastor now of Twenty third Street Baptist Church, New York, said the following to his congregation at the *Mail and Express* edited by Elliott F. Shepard:

"Such a newspaper assumes a pious whine, nauseating in the extreme, and poses as a representative of Christianity. It could not live without the assumption of some moral force; it would not be tolerated, and so it steals the livery of heaven. In the name of God and of truth, of honesty and of integrity, I, for one, repudiate this so-called newspaper as in any sense representative of Christianity. The God that presides over the editorial staff of the *Mail and Express* and such papers is not my God. About as near as I can make it, his God is the devil, whom I fight and fear, with this exception, that the devil is shrewder and more artistic in his methods.

"Hear this quasi editor shriek for an army of a million men to march on Richmond! For what? To rob the dying of the memory of the dead. Such men are neither brute or human; they are ghouls. The spirit of war is cruel and bloody, and yet war is manly and brave. Warriors never bayonet the dead. They never fire on a hospital. Twenty-five years have rolled away since those awful days. Peace and prosperity onward flow over mountain and plain and sea. And now in the midst of all these things the little tin soldier wakes up suddenly and wears the ears of heaven and earth with his little tin horn.

"Keep such newspapers from your homes as you would a pest. If you want vicious literature use the bald vulgarity of Swift or the naked realism of Zola. It would be less dangerous than the hatred and bigotry sheet wrapped up in a Scripture text. Men of the North and men of the South, we are brethren. Let us hear to-day the voice of the heroic dead. They all speak for peace and for harmony. The brave and true never fight after the battle is closed. The time has come for us to take each other by the hand, crush those influences that seek to perpetuate strife for a base, ignoble purpose. God help us, that we may have, in deed and truth, one glorious, united nation."
