A number of wealthy Jews recently offered \$200,000 for the Vatican's copy of the Hebrew Bible, but the Pope wouldn't sell. A similar offer to buy this Bible was made in 1512, when Julius II was greatly in need of money, but still he refused \$100,000. The nearest approach to such a price for a book hitherto was \$50,000, paid by the German Government in 1884 for the missal formerly given by Leo X to Henry VII, to gether with the parchment making the sovereign "Defender of the Faith." Charles II gave the missal to the Duke of Hamilton, and it stayed in his family for 200 years.

"William the Restless" is the Kaiser's new title, and his last reform in his naval uniforms. The new book of regulations says that an admiral may, when at sea, wear an oilskin sou'-wester and coat; but his shirt front must be perfectly plain and devoid of tucks or frills; the corners of his collar must on no account be rounded or doubled back, and the distance between the rows of gold lace on his sleeves must be 37559 of an inch. When he marries he must go through the ceremony in full uniform, and if he should be in Berlin on a Sunday, in certain parts of the city between noon and 4, he must wear his cocked hat. He may wear citizen's dress when shooting, at masked balls, at the seaside, and when on half pay; but otherwise, in order to obtain that privilege, he must produce a doctor's certificate to the effect that to wear uniform will injure his health.

The last comparison between the armies of France and Germany places the former ahead numerically while the latter is preparing to close the gap with the aid of the recent law. France on a peace footing has 520,548 men, and the law of five years' service recently enacted permits her to add 600,000 men to her territorial army. Other reforms increase the annual contingent by 60,000 men, and this brings it up to 220,000. By counting the twenty-five contingents under the law with their total losses, which are estimated at one quarter, the effective force for mobilization amounts to 4,125,000. In Germany their annual contingent is 164,000 recruits, 9,000 yearly volunteers and 17,450 reserves, giving a total for this contingent of 190,450. For the twenty-four contingents, and taking into account the losses, we arrive at a grand total on a war footing of 3,350,000 men. Consequently, France could mobilize at the present time 775,000 trained soldiers more than Germany.

The New York Sun says: "The Lee monument ceremonies at Richmond have called out many interesting facts relating to the career of Virginia's great soldier. According to Gen. A. L. Long, of Charlottesville, who was Lee's military secretary, and who during the blindness which has afflicted him since the war has written and published a life of his illustrious chief, the remote as well as immediate ancestors of Robert E. Lee were men of military fame. The founder of the family, in this account, was Lancelot Lee, of London, in France, who crossed to England with William, the Conqueror, distinguished himself at Hastings and acquired an estate at Essex. Lionel Lee, for his services under Richard Coeur de Lion at the siege of Acre, was rewarded by being made Earl of Litchfield. The immediate founder of the Virginia family was Richard Lee, who came to America in 1641 as colonial secretary under Sir William Berkeley. But however interesting these statements may be on their genealogical side, Robert Edward Lee does not derive lustre from Lancelot and Lionel, but rather brings them into prominence again after the lapse of centuries."
