The Atlantic Journal has made a prediction in an issue of the 1st of June and finds that the Southern States have made a larger decrease of their bonded debts than that of all the other States of the Union aggregated. Their decrease has amounted to \$28,022,964, while that of all other States is \$26,436,920. "For a section," says the Journal, "so recently devastated by war, left utterly penniless except in the possession of its real estate, with its labor demoralized and its industries all prostrated, this is a splendid showing." It is, indeed, and the North as well as the South will heartily rejoice in it.

The Washington correspondent of the Philadelphia Times says: "Mr. Blount, of Georgia, the successor of Randall on the committee on rules, will not vote for subsidies, and so it is a tie in committee. It is said that the Speaker was holding up the appointment of the additional Democratic member on that committee to the vacancy caused by Mr. Carlisle's resignation, with the hope of finding some reputable Democrat who would also vote to take up the subsidy bill. But it is hardly necessary to say that it would be hard to find a Democratic who would go on the rules committee to carry out such a programme."

The New York World says: "Several well known sporting men, who were led by what they thought to be first class tips, feel sore over recent investments in Richmond Terminal. 'I bought at 75¢ about ten days ago,' said one, 'and I am now about \$1,100 out and see nothing but more margins ahead of me. The stock is now 22, and has not gone up more than an eighth since I bought. John C. Calhoun, who was supposed to be right in with the Inman crowd threw a block of stock on the market, some say as much as 30,000 shares, and prices broken away at once. I wouldn't mind it if I were just now the possessor of a margin of a good many other lots of stock that I bought into on 'sure tips,' and would be very, very glad to crawl from under at almost any terms."

The Washington correspondent of the New York Sun says: "The Ohio ballot-box forgery scandal has taken a new and somewhat sensational turn. Notwithstanding the damaging character of the evidence against Ex-Governor Foraker, in whose interest the forgery was evidently committed, it has been the prevailing opinion up to this time among those conversant with the situation that the report of the House committee would contain a liberal amount of whitewash, and that Foraker would practically get off scot free. Such, however, is not to be the case. He is to be pilloried by Republicans, and his political rivals, headed by Gen. Grosvenor, who hates Foraker intensely, will hold the butter cup to his lips and make him drain it to the dregs. Foraker's foolishness in crowding himself forward as chairman of the coming State Convention has, in the opinion of those gentlemen, rendered heroic treatment imperative."

Moltke's successor, Waldersee, is making a military inspection of the various means by which German army might, in the event of war, be most rapidly brought to the French frontier, and is able to congratulate his countrymen that there are now seven double-track railroads, leading from East to West directly toward France, as against only three that existed in 1870. The last one, just opened, was not a commercial necessity so much as a strategic road, intended to obviate the necessity of crossing Swiss territory in getting into France. In fact, much of the burden of German taxation is represented by railways constructed and opened for military rather than commercial purposes. The Emperor and his prime minister have both had accidents with their horses during the past week, each running serious risk of his life. The rapidity with which the Emperor recovered from his accident is excellent evidence of the good health he enjoys, in spite of his having but one arm to speak of.
