Nearly all the business houses on Front and Market streets were closed at one o'clock this afternoon to give employees a half-holiday, and those thoroughfares presented a rather deserted appearance in consequence.

Good for Wilmington.  
The customs receipts at this port for the year ending June 1st, 1890, were \$50,026.40, and were collected at an expense of \$11,525.52. The postoffice receipts for the same time were \$25,336.28, yielding a net revenue of 48 per cent. It was upon this showing that a favorable report has been made to the House on Representative Rowland's bill to increase the appropriation for the public building here, fixing the limit to \$350,000.

A Dark Cloud.  
The most wild and threatening looking cloud we have seen in many a day gathered in the North and Northwest last evening. It was a genuine blue black in color and rose with great rapidity, overspreading the earth like an immense pall of smoke, indicating approaching high gales and heavy rains. It was accompanied by very little thunder and lightning, and as it turned out the wind only amounted to a brief, sharp squall, while the rainfall was heavy for a short time. But the cloud rose so rapidly and looked so threatening that it made belated pedestrians "hurry" lively to reach shelter before getting wet.

The third will be on Saturday, the 21st inst., which will be from Mt. Airy.

The health officers are busy looking after the sanitary condition of the city, and through their active exertions the streets and alleys, as well as the yards and out-buildings have been thoroughly cleaned and put in good order. Decaying vegetable or animal matter is not allowed to remain anywhere within the city limits, thus making an important step towards preventing disease from gaining a foothold here.

There was a large exodus of our citizens from the streets and hot brick walls of the city to Carolina Beach and the Hammocks this afternoon, and trains and steamers were crowded. A bath in the surf and the breezes from old ocean will re-invigorate the crowd and they will return better prepared to perform the labors of to-morrow, which is generally the busiest day of the week, and one in which clerks, salesmen and other employees of our business houses work more hours than those engaged in any other pursuits. Almost everybody can have a day off once in awhile, except newspaper men and printers on the daily press, but they, especially the latter, have got to stick to the case week in and week out unless they can get a "sub."
