 "It is stated at the pension office," says the Washington correspondent of the New York Herald, "that the deficiency in the amount of funds in the hands of the different pension agents, which has resulted in the announcement by the agent at Indianapolis that a large number of pensioners will be compelled to wait until July 1 for the payment of their pensions, has been caused by the unusually large number of allowances made by the pension office under the present Administration, and particularly since Gen. Raum's term began. The great amount of allowances has been largely in original cases. There have been issued already seven thousand more original pensions than were issued during the last fiscal year, and the office has yet a month's work before the end of the present fiscal year."

A Cedar Rapids, Iowa, paper on Tuesday published interviews with one hundred Republicans of that city, business men and laborers, which show that a large majority of them are opposed to the attempt being made by the framers of the McKinley bill to increase the duties on the necessities of life. A very few favor the bill as it stands, and quite a number enter strong protests against it. The majority are in favor of free raw materials and sugar with a much lower duty on wool. Many believe that the tariff should be only high enough to provide the necessary revenue for the maintenance of the Government, and that this tariff should be levied on the luxuries of life. A hardware man declares that the proposed increased duties on materials in that line, such as tin-plates, are "useless." Men employed in other lines of trade are equally severe in their criticism of this bill. The gist of the one hundred interviews is that the bill is not the tariff reform measure the Republican party promised to enact, but is a juggling and iniquitous one, and dissatisfaction with it and the men who are pushing it through Congress is the result.

A Washington dispatch to the Baltimore Sun says: "Secretary Windom has already received one thousand applications for the nine places on the board of general appraisers of customs. The Republican candidates are in the majority. Among them are several ex-Congressmen and a score of department officials ready and anxious to serve their country for the comfortable salary of \$7,000 a year. Of course there is a plentiful supply of Indiana applicants. Mr. McKinley has an Ohio man on hand and "Boss" Quay wants a place for a striker. Solicitor of the Treasury Hepburn will have Senator Allison's support. Assistant Secretary Tichenor is the only department official whose selection, as stated in yesterday's dispatches, is generally conceded. In the event of his appointment Mr. Tichenor will most likely be president of the board. His health is not very good, and a place on the board will be more congenial to him than his present desk-work, which is wearing him out. Many names are mentioned in connection with the four places to be filled by Democrats. The President and Secretary Windom have not yet considered any applications. The late Representative Randall, who was deeply interested in the customs bill and the work which would result therefrom, wrote a letter shortly before his death expressing his preference for Isaac H. Maynard, of New York, and Richard R. McMahon, of West Virginia. Mr. Maynard was assistant secretary, and Mr. McMahon deputy second comptroller, during the late Administration. Judge Maynard is not a candidate, and Mr. McMahon, it is alleged, has no desire to re-enter the service."
