It is said that the huckleberry crop (spell it whortleberry if you want to) is a perfect failure. This statement is made, too, in the face of the fact that the Third District Congressional Convention is to meet there in July.

There will be a big excursion from this city on Monday, July 14, to Washington City, under the management of W. H. Howe. Four days will be allowed in the Capitol and the fare is only \$7. A special car will be provided for white persons.

Mr. J. T. Bryant, of this city, sawyer of the W. O. & E. C. R. R., brought here a day or day ago, some of the prettiest oak lumber we ever saw. It was gotten out 15 miles from the city for Messrs. C. B. Southerland & Co. and was delivered to them at their carriage and wagon factory.

One of the pumps of the "Atlantic" fire steamer, which was out of order and was sent North for repairs, has been returned, all completed. A new axle for the Cape Fear hose reel, to take the place of that recently broken at the corner of Market and Second streets, was also received to day.

Deep Sea Soundings. The *Sylvan Grove* carried down a goodly number of fishermen to day, bound for a frolic on salt water. Some got off at the Rocks and others at Southport but the majority steamed on out to sea to the Blackfish Grounds. They have had a good day for it and ought to bring home with them this evening a large number of fish.

First of the season. Officer Howland was called to the shipyard this morning to shoot a dog, thought to be mad, that was snapping at everybody around there. Just before the officer reached the scene, however, the animal laid down and died, without waiting to be shot. This is thought to have been a genuine case of rabies, and is the first on record here this season.

Not a Candidate. Gen. S. H. Manning, it is said, will not be a candidate for the re-nomination for Sheriff of this county for another term. He will retire into the shades of private life and will devote his time and attention entirely to his own private business interests. He has been sheriff of the county for 16 years, 8 consecutive terms, and has had enough of official life. He is largely interested in a number of financial enterprises in this city and we are glad to know that he will continue his residence among us.

Ice Rather Looking Down. The New York papers had it on Saturday that ice had declined but yesterday they qualified this statement. There seems to be a plentiful supply of the article in storage somewhere in Maine, but the prices have not yet had a decided decline, except in wholesaling. It is now \$8 per ton, delivered, 60 cents per hundred to butchers and 75 cents per hundred to families. At the docks it is wholesaled and retailed at somewhat lower prices than these. In Richmond, where it sold a few weeks ago at 1 1/2 cents, it is now delivered at 1 cent a pound.

Weekly Weather Crop Bulletin.

The reports of correspondents of the Weekly Weather Crop Bulletin, issued by the North Carolina Experiment Station and State Weather Service, co-operating with the United States Signal Service, says that the weather during the week ending Friday, June 13th, 1890, has generally been very favorable for growing crops and harvesting operations. The temperature was low for a few days, but slightly above the average during the latter part of the week. The sky has been partly cloudy nearly every day. The rainfall was badly disturbed though showers were frequent. Heavy rain and hail in the northwest portion of Wake county on the 12th injured crops, beating down cotton and washing the land. In a few counties the weather has continued very dry. The harvesting of wheat and oats progressed rapidly during the past seven days, and is nearly completed. The yield of wheat seems even less than anticipated from preceding reports and is probably fully thirty per cent. below the average, if not more. Other crops are growing rapidly, are clean and well worked.

Special reports were received during this week in regard to the condition of the cotton and tobacco crops throughout the State. The cotton crop is everywhere reported to be in remarkably fine condition, better than it has been at this season for many years past. There is not a single dissenting voice concerning the splendid prospects for the crops in North Carolina. In the Eastern District there has been a decrease of a few per cent. in the acreage planted in cotton, in the Central District the acreage planted is fully up to the average, while there has been a considerable increase in the western portions of the State. For the entire State the acreage planted is probably 107 per cent. The condition of tobacco is fair. The entire crop has not yet been planted and it is difficult to estimate its general condition which will undoubtedly improve with continued favorable weather.
