Hereafter, on Tuesdays and Fridays, the *Grove* will make an extra trip to Carolina Beach. On those days she will make three trips; leaving here at 9.30 a. m., 2.30 p. m. and 5 p. m. The last train will leave the Beach on Tuesday and Friday at 9 o'clock.

The Sunday School of the Second Advent Baptist Church will give an excursion to Carolina Beach tomorrow. The boat will make two trips, leaving here at 9.30 a. m. and 2.30 p. m. The ladies will serve refreshments and all who attend may be assured of a good time.

A Handsome Monument.

Messrs. H. A. Tucker & Co., proprietors of the marble yard on North Front street, near Mulberry, are now at work on a handsome and imposing granite monument which has been ordered by Alfred Howe, the well known colored builder and contractor, to mark the spot in Pine Forest Cemetery where rests the remains of his daughter, I. L. Howe. The monument is 10 feet high. It is to be erected on Friday next, and it will be the first granite monument raised in that silent city of the dead.

His Horse Gave Him Away.

When the first fire alarm sounded this morning a young fireman, who rooms on Princess street, rushed to the stable and harnessed Chief Newman's horse and hitched him to the fire buggy. He then started out at a fast trot but when endeavoring to turn the horse from one street to another found that in his haste he had failed to get the bit in the horse's mouth and therefore had no control over the animal. But a turn was made and the young man was thrown out, fortunately alighting on his feet. The horse then made a mad dash straight for Paddy's Hollow but was stopped at box 15, corner Front and Mulberry.

Audit and Finance.

The Board of Audit and Finance met yesterday in semi-monthly session. Present: Messrs. R. J. Jones, chairman, W. R. Kenan and Jno. W. Hewett.

A communication was received from the Board of Aldermen stating that an appropriation of \$500 had been made for codifying the laws and ordinances. On motion, consideration of the matter was deferred.

The action of the Board of Aldermen in granting leave of absence to Chief of Police Hall during May and June was concurred in.

Bills for current expenses, amounting to \$1,443.43, were audited and approved.

The meeting adjourned subject to the call of the chairman.

Forecasts.

For North Carolina, fair weather, preceded by showers on the coast and stationary temperature. Local forecasts, from 8 a. m. to-day, for Wilmington and vicinity, fair weather, followed by showers.

The Population of the State.

In 1870 the population of North Carolina was 1,071,361. In 1880 it was 1,512,565, showing a percentage of increase between 1870 and 1880 of 39.6. At the same ratio of increase the population of the State by the present census will be 1,828,073.

Large Excursion Party.

A large excursion party, all white, arrived here this afternoon about 3.30 o'clock on the Carolina Central Railroad. They came from points on the R. & A. A. L. and the C. C. R. R. There were seven coaches, well filled. They will remain here to night and to-morrow and the majority of them will make a break at once for salt water, some going down on the Seacoast Railroad and others to Carolina Beach and Southport.

Grand Lodge K. of P.

The Grand Lodge of Knights of Pythias will meet in Durham tomorrow. The delegates from the three lodges here are as follows: W. H. Yopp, from Stonewall No. 1; Capt. W. P. Oldham, from Clarendon No. 2, and H. L. Vollers, from Germania No. 4. These gentlemen will leave here to night on the C. C. R. R. accompanied by Grand Chancellor Thos. D. Meares and Grand Keeper of Records and Seals, John L. Dudley. Capt. E. G. Parmele will also be in attendance from this city.

Cottages for Carolina Beach.

The frames of two cottages, all complete and ready to be put together, came down from Fayetteville to day on the steamer *D. Murchison*. They were made at Fayetteville for Capt. Sandy Robeson and Mr. Walter Watson, who will have them put up at once at Carolina Beach and occupy them during the summer. Capt. Harper tells us that two more of these cottages are to come from Fayetteville, for parties from that town, and that they are expected here in a few days.

The Library Rooms.

The Wilmington Library was never in a better condition than now. Compared to the population of the place it is probably as large and complete as can be found anywhere in the country. There are two librarians, the rooms are lighted by electricity and they are kept open from 10 a. m. until 10 p. m. A new rule allows back numbers of periodicals to be taken out for home reading. This is an important concession.

Yet the Library Association is not at ease as to its finances. At least two hundred more members are needed and those should be secured. Every endeavor is being made to place it on a self-sustaining basis and the efforts in this direction should meet with the hearty cooperation of every member.

Southport's Road to Be Built.

Here is some good news for our friends at Southport. We hope that it may prove correct. The *Charlotte News* says: "The proposed railroad from Southport, on the coast below Wilmington, to Memphis, Tenn., is to be known as the South Atlantic & Northwestern Railroad. It is to be built, and work is to commence within 90 days from date. Col. Risley, who has engineered the scheme, arrived at the Central Hotel to-day direct from England, and has perfected all arrangements to begin the work of building the road without delay. He has secured all the necessary money, and there is now no obstacle in the way of building the road. Col. Risley's company means business, and work is to be commenced at ten different points along the line within three months. Col. Risley says the road will be completed and in running order within two years. The road will run through Salisbury and Mocksville."

Sixth Judicial District.

At a called meeting of the delegates to the Judicial Convention held at the Mayor's office yesterday evening the following business was transacted:

Mr. W. R. French was called to the chair, and Mr. N. Jenkins requested to act as secretary.

On motion of Mr. M. Cronly, Jr., Mr. Iredell Meares was elected permanent chairman of the delegation and Mr. N. Jenkins permanent secretary.

On motion of Col. J. W. Atkinson the following resolutions were unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, Within the period of the past fifty years, New Hanover county, while contributing her vote on frequent occasions to the political and judicial preferment of the distinguished sons of her neighboring sister counties, has never claimed or received the honor of having any one of her long line of eminent lawyers elevated to the bench; and, whereas, within the past twenty years the Democrats of New Hanover county, though contending against an overwhelming Radical majority, have invariably rallied to the standard and fought the battle of Democracy with untiring zeal, energy and devotion, contributing thereby largely to the supremacy of that party and the consequent redemption of the State and lodgment of the power and government in efficient and upright hands; and

WHEREAS, The New Hanover county Democracy is assured that not only is it entitled to, but its aspirations receive the sympathy of sister counties, to have the Democratic nomination for the Judgeship in the next Sixth Judicial District conferred upon a New Hanover county man; and whereas, at the recent Democratic primaries held in this county preference was expressed by a majority of the wards and precincts for Thomas W. Strange, Esq., of Wilmington, N. C., as the Democratic candidate for Judge in the Sixth Judicial District; and whereas, the opposing candidate from New Hanover has by formal announcement to the New Hanover County Democratic Convention withdrawn his name from further consideration in connection with said nomination; therefore, be it

Resolved 1st, That this delegation, in meeting assembled, having been appointed by the Democratic County Convention to represent New Hanover county in the Democratic Convention of the Sixth Judicial District, do recognize and endorse Thomas W. Strange, Esq., as a lawyer whose professional education, experience and ability, and whose purity, uprightness and firmness of character will qualify him for the position named, and would enable him, in the event of his nomination and election, to sit upon the bench with dignity and honor to himself, his county and State.

Resolved 2nd, That this delegation will present his name to the Democratic Convention of the Sixth Judicial District, for its consideration; that it will vote for him as a unit, and use every effort honorable and proper to secure his nomination.

A committee being appointed to make necessary arrangements for the transportation of delegates, the meeting adjourned subject to the call of the chairman.

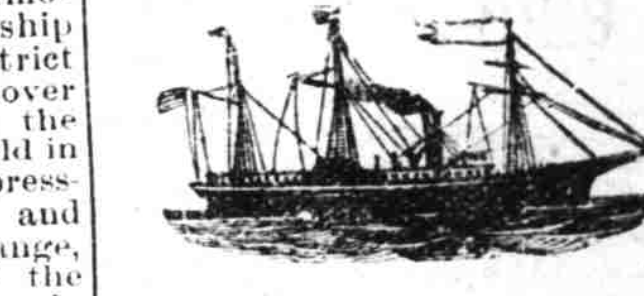
