Got the Entire Gang.
Information was lodged at the City Hall to-day that a gang of tramps, seven in number, were located in the woods near the turnpike just east of the city and officers Tietgen, Howell and Wood were detailed for their capture. A Bad Week.
In all, there have been 17 deaths in this city during the present week. Of these 11 were children and the fearfully warm weather may account for this, in a great measure. The mortality among the children is always the greatest, everywhere, when the thermometer is at its highest. There were four deaths by violence, also, in the list. Oakdale reports three, all children; Bellevue three, two adults and one child, and Pine Forest eleven, four adults and seven children.

At the Beach Yesterday.
The number of those who went down to Carolina Beach yesterday on the excursion given by the W. S. F. E. Co. No. 1 is conservatively estimated at 800. It was the ideal day for an outing of this nature and the fact was liberally appreciated. The wind was from the East and there was a good surf, which was full of bathers nearly all day long. The Passport brought up a large number in the afternoon and it required two trips of the train to take all from the beach to the boat.

The Fourth at the Beach.
There will be big times at Carolina Beach on the Fourth, and it is expected that the fun there on that day will far eclipse that of any other day in the history of the place. An extensive programme is now being arranged and will be made known in full in a few days. It will include two concerts by the Germania Band, a bear hunt, boat races, foot races, music and dancing, music by the Harper quartette and fireworks. The Grove and Passport will both make extra trips during the day to meet the demand.

Married This Morning.
Rt. Rev. A. A. Watson, D. D., Bishop of the Diocese of East Carolina, was married this morning to Miss Mary C. Lord, daughter of the late Mr. F. J. Lord. The ceremony took place in St. James' Church, at 8:30 o'clock, and was performed by the Rector of the Church, Rev. Robert Strange. It was very quiet, only the relations and a number of intimate friends of the Bishop and his bride having been present. The bride advanced up the altar, leaning on the arm of her brother, Mr. F. Anrum Lord, who gave her away, and met the groom at the altar. The music was of a nature befitting the occasion and was delightfully rendered with Mrs. M. E. Cushing at the organ.

At the conclusion of the ceremony the Bishop and his bride drove to Front street depot and embarked for Kinston, near which place there is an ordination service for to-morrow. On Monday they will leave for New York where they will visit friends for a few days and on the following Monday, the 8th of July, they will sail in the steamer *Ataska* for Liverpool, visiting points of interest in England and Continental Europe, and will return here in the Fall.

State Dental Association.

A vote of thanks was extended to resident dentists of Wilmington for courtesies, and to Messrs. Selby and Marshal of the S. S. Dental Manufacturing Co., of Philadelphia, for favors shown the Society.

A resolution thanking Mr. Montague, manager of The Orton, for the princely entertainment given while guests of his famous Southern hotel, was unanimously adopted. Also, to various railroads for reduced rates, etc.

The next meeting will be held at Durham, on the first Tuesday in May, 1891.

The Association then adjourned. All express themselves as well pleased with Wilmington, and will carry away pleasant recollections of their visit to the city by the sea.

In the Market.
Green corn sells now at 20 cents a dozen; okra at 5 cents a dozen; tomatoes at two quarts for a quart; carrots at 5 cents for two bunches; potatoes at 20 cents a peck and onions at 5 cents a quart. Berries are scarce. Huckleberries sell at 15 cents a quart, raspberries at 15 cents a quart and blackberries at 12 cents. There is no native fruit as yet in market.
