Ashore in Long Bay.
Advices received through the Signal Office state that the Dutch barque Pauline, J. Elits, master, from Appalachicola, Fla., for Del, Holland, with a cargo of square timber, sprang a leak day before yesterday, became unmanageable and went ashore in Long Bay, S. C., two miles South of Cherry Grove and about 35 miles from Southport. She went ashore at high water, under part sail, and is hard and fast. She had five feet of water when she struck and is now full. The vessel will prove a total loss but some of the cargo may be saved, only at great cost, however. The Captain is at Southport, having gone overland to that place from the wreck.

All Native Meat.
There has been a good supply of fresh meat in market lately. Notwithstanding the warm weather the supply seems to get better as the season advances. It is all native meat. There will be no more Kansas meat here before the Fall and as a consequence not only the supply of native meat is better but the demand for it is greater and steadily growing.

Scribner's for July.
An excellent table of contents is found in the Midsummer number of this excellent monthly. A pretty, pleasing picture, "O Babbling Spring," is the frontispiece. "The Suburban House" handsomely illustrated, will interest those who are about to build. "Horace, Book III, Ode XIII," is Austin Dobson's translation, in rondeau form; there are two chapters of the new serial, "Jerry;" "Bird Cradles" is an exquisite article, delightfully illustrated; the fourth of the series of "The Rights of the Citizen" is dedicated to "His Own Reputation;" "Under Five Shillings" and "To the Cricket" will both be read with interest; "In the Valley" is concluded in this issue; "The House of Tembinoka" by Robert Louis Stevenson, is illustrated from photographs taken by the author; and "Surf and Surf Bathing" is a timely article, happily illustrated. The paper which, however, will probably prove most attractive to the largest number is "The Last Slave Ship," by George Howe, M. D., who the New York Herald says, managed to get back home in time "to fight gallantly for the Union." In other words this slave-thief, with his pockets full of gold from the traffic in human flesh, enlisted to fight men who owned slaves bequeathed to them by their ancestors. But, as the Herald shows, Howe is mistaken. His was not the last slave ship. The Thomas Watson was the last. She was owned by a woman who lived in the patriotic, liberty-loving State of Massachusetts. She entered the Cape Fear in distress in May, 1861, and this writer boarded her officially. She was undoubtedly a slaver and fitted up as such. She was allowed to leave port unharmed—why, we never could understand.

Looking Up a Little.
We learn from the Southport Leader that Mr. E. B. Stevens, who is largely interested in the proposed South Atlantic & Northwestern R. R., has just returned from New York, where he was engaged in the affairs of the railroad. Mr. Stevens says the S. A. & N. W. R. R. for some months past has received the attention of English capitalists. "Its various prospects are recognized by the Englishmen, but the parties who are interested on this side wish to retain the control of the railroad and not let others control absolutely a railroad which has such immense possibilities. At present a syndicate in Paris are interested in the construction of this grand trunk line across North Carolina. Within a few weeks most important results may be looked for in connection with this road."

There seems to be some life, too, in the Cape Fear and Cincinnati project, notwithstanding the fact that its properties have been under the hammer to satisfy judgment in favor of its employees. Mr. Geo. B. Morton, who seems to be the moving spirit in this enterprise, has been very sick but he writes that he is out again and says: "All our financial matters are signed for, and just as quick as I can arrange a lot of detail here, I shall leave for Southport, there to take up my headquarters, and begin operations. I have this day notified our new resident engineer, a native North Carolinian, to report to Baltimore for instructions, and before many days you shall see old Southport torn up and the sound of the trip hammer on our new wharves, &c."

The Manufacturers' Record says that the work will commence within 90 days on the South Atlantic & Northwestern Railroad, and that "the Massachusetts Construction Company has been awarded the contract for constructing the Cape Fear and Cincinnati Railroad from Southport to Wilmington, 25 miles, and from Southport to Salisbury, 195 miles distant."

Weekly Weather Crop Bulletin.

The reports of correspondents of the Weekly Weather Crop Bulletin, issued by the North Carolina Experiment Station and State Weather Service, co-operating with the United States Signal Service, show that favorable conditions again prevailed during the week ending Friday July 4th, 1890. The part of June continued to be very warm and dry, but July opened with general though not very heavy rains, which were timely and greatly refreshed vegetation. The rains of July 1st and 2nd were better distributed in the Central and Western districts than in the Eastern, but there are places in all districts where the rainfall has not been sufficient and crops are consequently suffering somewhat. Reports are, however, uniformly good, with few complaints of "the weather," and as correspondents remark, "Farmers go on their way rejoicing."
