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

The decrease in the national debt for the fiscal year just ended was \$88,471,448. For the preceding fiscal year it was \$114,000,000. The falling off is not due to decreased revenue. The receipts of the treasury have been increased; but the expenses of the Government under Republican administration have been increased in still larger ratio. The surplus has been already practically disposed of, and it is quite possible before the end of the Harrison Administration that the vast revenue of the coun try will be inadequent to meet the demands of the treasury ..

Fargo, the Dakota town that has just been devastated by a cyclone. had its first boom and had settled down to grow on a conservative basis. Its sight is on the Red River, the Eastern boundary of North Dakota, 254 miles west of Duluth. Ten years ago the town had 2,693 people, one or two newspapers, two churches, a steamboat landing and a United States land office. Its growth began in 1871, but it was only in a small way. Later the big wheat growers were attracted to the neighboring land, and its fertility proved so great that Fargo as the nearest town prospered famously. This year its population is 10,000, making it one of the largest cities in North Dakota and the metropolis of the rich Red River Valley. Railroads make it a centre for the eastern part of North Dakota, twenty-six trains passing through the town each day. It is the county seat of Cass county, and this year finds it with twenty-eight hotels, twelve churches, four banks, three daily and three weekly newspapers, several monthly publications, three public halls, an Opera House, a theatre, a Court House, Every man shoul costing \$100,000, a system of street railway and of water works supplying the country for a radius of fifty miles, a good department of schools, gas and electric light plants, three elevators, with a capacity of over 500,000 bushels, planing and paper mills, 250 stores and many factories-
