The Marion Guards, of Marion, S. C., will arrive here to-morrow and go to Southport on the steamer Passport at 10 o'clock, where they will be in camp for a week or ten days.

Hon. C. W. McClammy was in the city last evening. He went up the road this morning and will probably be at Clinton to-morrow to receive his third nomination for Congress.

Col. E. D. Hall, Chief of Police, returned from Southport last week and is at his post of duty again. We are glad to note that he appears to have almost entirely recovered his usual good health.

Just About the Size of It.

D. J. Bowers is the name of the young colored man who was arrested yesterday, charged with an assault on Mr. Tom Quinlivan on Saturday night. We had the name in type in the article we published but at his especial request we withheld it, on the understanding with Bowers that the other papers had agreed to suppress it. They published it this morning.

Bowers was before the Mayor yesterday and was released on a bond of \$100 for his appearance at the Criminal Court. It was probably a mistake all around. It was very dark at the point where the encounter took place. Bowers was at his own gate, from which he had just emerged. He did not recognize Mr. Quinlivan and thought he was about to be assaulted by a footpad when he struck him with the stick. This is probably about the size of the whole thing.

Bad Whiskey in a Bad Man.

A colored man, whose name we have vainly tried to learn, created considerable disturbance on the coast last night. He was first put out of Mr. Nixon's saloon at Wrightsville, where he had entered and drawn a knife and threatened dire vengeance on the proprietor but quickly came to his senses when he found a pistol pointed directly at his head. Later he turned up on Wrightsville Beach and entered Mr. Jas. A. Hewlett's bar, from which he was ejected. Still later he attacked Mr. Hewlett near his dining room when Mr. Hewlett met him with a square blow between the eyes, which floored him. He then arose and with knife in hand was making for Mr. Hewlett again when Prof. O'Neill, Mr. Layton's trainer, stepped before him and planted a blow squarely under his jaw, which landed him on the sand ten feet away. He was then bound, for the purpose of bringing him to town, but was subsequently, for some reason unknown to us, released.

Criminal Court.

Ejiza Burden, selling liquor on Sunday. Not guilty.
Ed. Smith, Ed. King and Henry McNeill, colored, were convicted of larceny and sentenced each to 18 months in the penitentiary.

State vs. Mary Smith, for larceny. Not guilty.
State vs. William Finch, for larceny. Not guilty.
State vs. Thomas Vann, for larceny. Guilty and sentenced to three years in the Penitentiary.

The Grand Jury found a true bill against Dennis Horn, charged with highway robbery, and the case is set for trial on Friday.

THE ENCAMPMENT.

Only One Company Yet on Hand But the Others to Arrive This Evening—The Camp to Open To-Night.

Up to this time, but one company the Washington Light Infantry, Co. G, 1st Regiment, has arrived. They came in last evening and went down to Wrightsville about 8 o'clock. Capt. Chas. F. Warren is in command and he reports 33 men for duty. Adjutant General Glenn and nearly every other man of the headquarters staff are on the ground. The remaining companies of the two regiments will all arrive here this afternoon and evening and will proceed direct to the camp.

A detachment of artillery from Fortress Monroe, consisting of nine men, arrived yesterday evening and will give instruction in battery drill and in cannon and mortar firing at the permanent grounds. The mortar range will be two thousand and the cannon range three thousand yards. The artillery exercises will probably begin Wednesday. Sergeant Jonathan Helcher, of Battery I, 2d Artillery, is Chief of Detachment, and is accompanied by Corporal Patrick Egan, of Battery G, 5th Artillery, gunner, and six cannoners, as follows: Ervin Johnson, Battery B, 3d artillery; J. P. Lewis, Battery I, 2d artillery; Lewis Wadstrum, Battery H, 4th artillery; Sydney Savage, Battery F, 1st artillery; O. P. Belcher, Battery G, 5th artillery; Charles Berry, Battery M, 3d artillery. Morris Jansen, of Battery H, 4th artillery, is the steward of the detachment.

The rifle practice will be under the direct supervision of Col. Stanhope E. Blunt, of the U. S. Army, who has been detailed for duty at Camp Latimer during the Encampment.

General Orders No. 12 have been issued. There are 16 sections relative to the conduct of the camp. There will be drills every day except Sunday. On that day there will be a general inspection. The daily routine for the camp is designated as follows:

There are 251 tents in all with the usual buildings for the accommodation of the different messes.

Capt. Manning is caterer for the headquarters mess and we know that the epauletted gentlemen will be sorry when the time comes to strike the tents and break the encampment.

Each regiment is expected to have from 300 to 400 men in camp, making between 600 and 800, all told. Everybody will be in camp tonight. A troop train of five cars will be here this evening over the C. F. & Y. V. Railroad, the Carolina Central train will bring the Hornets Nest Rifleman from Charlotte, and a troop train of 13 cars will arrive over the W. & W. Road.

Bills were audited and approved for current expenses of the city to the amount of \$50 01.
