Governor Ross, of Texas, has ac cepted the presidency of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of that State, and will assume charge as soon as his term as Governor expires. His efficient service as Gov ernor pointed him out as the proper person to conduct the affairs of the Agricultural College. He became Governor four years ago, when the State Treasury was empty and the land affairs were in a state of apparently hopeless confusion. Among the features of his administration are the collection of nearly \$1,000,-000 from the Federal Government, the remission of \$1,050,000 in taxes to the people, the establishment of a State reformatory, of a State erphan asylum, of an asylum for colored deaf mutes and blind children, of the Western Texas Lunatic Asylum, the doubling of the capac ity of the North Texas Lunatic Asylum, large additions to the Agricultural and Mechanical College and to the University, the loan from the State's general revenues of half a million dolfars to pay the debt of the public schools incurred under former administrations, a reduction of the rate of taxation and a surplus revenue of \$750,000 now on hand. The schools have been restored to a cash basis, and order has succeeded to the confusion existing in the land administration as a direct result of administrative measures. Governor Ross, like ex-Governor Lubbock, was a distinguished Confederate soldier and a native of South Carolina.

It is said that there are now ten Republican Senators who it is said are opposed to the Force bill and to these may possibly be odded one other-Aldrich, of Rhode Island, who is on the ragged edge at this time. The Herald's Washington correspondent says: "Senator Paddock, of Nebraska, has been telling his Republican associates some interesting facts about the sentiment in the Eastern States regarding the Federal Elections bill. Senator Paddock has recently returned from a trip to that section. While in New York and Boston he met a uumber of prominent business men, the majority of whom are Republicans and all of whom denounced the measure in strong terms. Senator Paddock himself is antagonistic to the bill and does not hesitate to say that he will vote against it. When the Nebraska Senator came back to Washington he scattered these facts with blunt Western frankness among his party associates, with a result which is described as little short of paralyzing. Mr. Paddock's position on the Election bill will prove very gratifying to the opponents of the measure, who in the absence of knowledge to the contrary have regarded him as one of its sup-

Senator Washburn, of Minnesota, is also among the Republicans who refuse to be driven by the crack of the party lash into a support of the bill. He is quoted as saying in a recent conversation that injury has always resulted to parties which favored legislation of this character. His YON GRAFF TROCHER CO. Free The people in his part of the country, he said, have no interest in the DENNYROVAL DILL C bill, and he, like Senator Paddock, will vote against it if ever it comes before the Senate.

"Senator Aldrich, of Rhode Island, is said to find his connection with the bill an embarrassing one: The city of Providence is largely interested in the Southern trade through its steamship line and manufactories. The people at the head of these various enterprises are uniformly Republican in politics, but they realize that the passage of so obnoxious a measure cannot fail to engender bad feeling and in the end work them no little injury from a commercial standpoint. For this reason I am told they are urging Senator Aldrich to use his influence against the adoption of the bill in any man-

ner that to him seems proper.

"The list of Republican Senators opposed to the bill up to the present time is ten in number, embracing such gentlemen of prominence Geo. H. Brown, as Mr. Edmunds, of Vermont; Mr. Paddock, of Nebraska; Messrs. Teller and Wolcott, of Colorado; Messrs. Washburn and Davis, of Minnesota; Messrs. Jones and Stewart, of Ne- James C. 
