Found the Sheep.
Mr. John F. Garrell lodged complaint yesterday that a dressed sheep had been stolen from his slaughter house. A search warrant was issued and the mutton was found at the house of an old colored man by the name of Emanuel Truesdale, corner Tenth and Bladen streets, who said that another man had left it with him. Truesdale was before the Mayor this morning but a full hearing was postponed until Thursday next, the defendant being admitted to bail in the sum of \$50.

Ready in December.
It is now thought that the new public building will be finally completed, and the grounds around it laid out, by the first of December, four months from date. Bids for improving the grounds will be opened on the 15th inst. and the contract awarded. In front, on the Front street side, and on the Chestnut street side a pavement will be laid extending around and connecting with a driveway on the West of the building. This driveway will run from Chestnut street, on the rear and around to the South side, entering Front street adjoining Messrs. Alderman & Flanner's store. A space is to be reserved on either side of the Front street entrance as a grass plat. The pavement is to be of huge stone flags, 5x12 feet, and each weighing 4 1/2 tons. A stone coping will extend around the property on the three streets, with a wooden fence on the South, and the balance of the grounds West of the driveway is to be laid out in grass plats, with walks, &c. The trees on Front and Chestnut streets bordering on the property are to be removed. As soon as the postoffice has been transferred to the new quarters the building on the corner of Chesnut and Second streets, and that South of it are to be advertised and sold, the purchaser to remove them in sixty days.

Barquentine Ashore.
Signal Observer Demain, at Southport, telegraphs the office here that the British barquentine Lydia fouled her anchors last night, and drifting with the ebbing tide struck the pilot boat Addie, injuring her slightly. She then grounded on Battery Island shoals. It is expected that she will float off without injury as soon as the tide begins to go out.

On to Augusta.
Mr. H. Walters, General Manager of the Atlantic Coast Line, Mr. W. G. Elliott, President of the W. & W. R. R., and Col. Fleming Gardner, of the Coast Line, were in Augusta a day or two ago on business relating to the extension of the W. C. & A. R. R. to that city. "Our plans," said Mr. Walters, "contemplate reaching Augusta from Manchester, S. C., a small town the other side of Orangeburg. It is known as the Manhattan & Augusta Railroad and leaves the Wilmington, Columbia & Augusta Railroad at Sumter, then down to the Santee river and through to Orangeburg and to Augusta, passing about a mile from Aiken. The road has been surveyed and is graded for most of its length. At present an angle is described going to Wilmington. This will be cut off and a saving of sixty two miles result."

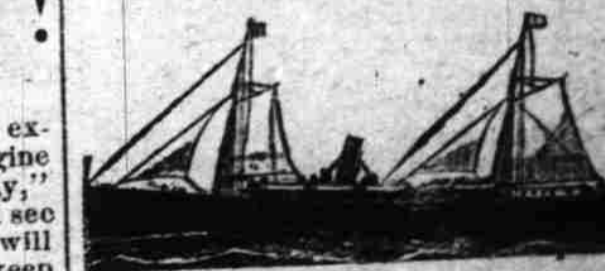
