Which Is the Man?  
Mayor Fowler and Solicitor Moore both think they have in hand the murderer of Mr. Nathan Falls. One of the suspected is in the guard house and the other is in jail. The latter is named Charles Maynor. The case against him has been worked up by a detective from the North and the matter has been kept very quiet. He was fully committed by Justice Bunting for the action of the Grand Jury at the next term of the Criminal Court.

Meteorological.  
Mr. F. P. Chaffee, Signal Service Observer, furnishes a summary of the weather conditions in July, from which the following is taken:  
The mean barometer for the month was 30.07; highest, 30.30 on the 30th; lowest, 29.73 on the 3d. The mean temperature was 77°; highest, 92° on the 8th; lowest 58°, on the 11th. The total deficiency in temperature during the month was 100°. The prevailing direction of the wind during the month was southwest; total movement, 550 miles. The total rainfall was 8.22 inches; deficiency in precipitation during the month 1.07. There were six cloudless days; 14 days partly cloudy; 11 cloudy days. Thunder storms occurred on the 3d, 5th, 9th, 10th, 18th, 19th and 27th.

Probable Fatal Affray.  
We find in the Greensboro Patriot an account of an affray which occurred at that place on Wednesday evening, between two young painters, both said to be from this city, which may result fatally to one of the young painters. Young James is, we think, a son of Capt. F. M. James, but we have no recollection or knowledge of the other man.

It seems that both the young men were in love with the same girl and that she had discarded James for Pleasants. This caused a quarrel between them some days ago and Pleasants moved to another boarding place.

Yesterday evening, says the Patriot, James came to where Pleasants was at work on Clegg's house in South Greensboro and renewed the quarrel. Becoming exasperated at some remark made by Pleasants, James seized a piece of scantling and struck him a murderous blow, knocking him down. As Pleasants picked himself up, he drew a barlow knife and rushing upon James began cutting him to pieces. One thrust of the knife entered the chest and penetrated the lung. Numerous wounds were inflicted on the sides and abdomen.

After the cutting Pleasants walked up street and told officer Whittington that he had cut a man badly in self defense, and wanted to surrender himself after the man had been attended to. Mr. Whittington went on out to see after the wounded man and Pleasants walked around to the Mayor's office and waited until he returned. He was lodged in jail and a preliminary trial is being held as we go to press.

Pleasants says that as he rose after being knocked down with the piece of scantling, James rushed upon him with drawn knife and inflicted an ugly cut on his hand. He shows a wound on the hand, and his head and arm are badly bruised where James hit him.  
The Patriot also says that it is reported that the cause of the quarrel was not a girl but a board bill.

Why the Court Was Held in the County Jail.

EDITOR OF THE REVIEW:—For the benefit of a certain constitutional editor, allow me through the columns of the REVIEW to answer the question, "Why was the Court held in the County Jail?" He refers to the preliminary examination of the testimony in the case of Charles Maynor, charged with the homicide of the late Nathan Falls.

In the first place a preliminary examination is not a trial—a trial such as is provided for in the constitution quoted by the constitutional editor, or by law.

In the second place the preliminary investigation "was open." The prisoner had all the witnesses he desired, summoned and examined, "and right and justice administered without sale, denial or delay."

The place of the trial was the reception room of the jail, but neither place nor time was advertised and this was not done in order that the usual crowd of curious idlers attending all such investigations should be avoided. This was done at the suggestion of the Solicitor of the Criminal Court.

The constitutional editor should get his law straight before he talks of facts, and he should get his facts right before he applies the law.
